REFORT TO THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF URANTIA BROTHERHOOD

of the work of the Charter Committee during the year 1959.

During the year 1959, as in 1958, no group studying the Urantia Book applied for a charter and installation as a Urantia society, and obviously in that way the Charter Committee has been inactive. Further, the completion of the simpler, shorter pattern constitution for societies, which the Charter Committee has devised, awaits decision by the Judicial Committee regarding its constitutionality. In fact, this has been the least active year of our existence, with only year meetings for the year.

At first, in 1955, Charter Committee was faced with the urgent and immediate necessity to produce a form of charter, standards of admission for both founders and later members, initiation rituals for each, and a sample constitution as a suggestion for new societies. These various documents were in usable form for the installation of First Urantia Society on June 17,1956. The year 1957 saw the inauguration of three societies -- at Glenview, Fasadena, and Oklahoma City. But there has been none since.

Experience made evident the advisability of certain revisions in some of the forms used, and in providing clear statments of requirements and steps to be taken by groups interested in becoming societies. These projects occupied Charter Committee in 1958 and 1959. Recently we mailed such information to two inquirers. We now feel the necessity of some sort of introductory, less detailed, more general statement for first inquiries, and this, among other things, we shall undertake in the near future.

Report of COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION of URANTIA BROTHERHOOD for year 1959

To the Executive Committee of Urantia Brotherhood:

The chief responsibility of this Committee is the conduct of the Urantia Brotherhood School. During this year, the part-time program has been continued - two courses being conducted every Wednesday evening of the school year.

The second semester of the present school year, extending from February into June, was devoted to the study of DOCTRINE OF URANTIA BOOK, Part IV, which I conducted, and WORLD RELIGIONS, conducted by Tom Wideroe.

The Fall semester was devoted to a course on WORSHIP AND WISDOM, which I am conducting, and the beginning of a two-year's course on SCIENCE IN THE URANTIA BOOK, conducted by Alvin Kulieke.

The enrollment remains about the same from year to year, running in the neighborhood of twenty-five students registered for credit, and about twenty-five auditors.

On the whole, I feel rather satisfied with the program of the Brotherhood School except in the matter of new students. A study of the personnel of the student body raveals that we are having about the same students from year to year. There are only a small number of new students each year, and this gives me some concern as I look into the future.

It is our custom to hold commencement or graduation exercises at the beginning of the Fall term. This year we graduated six Certified Leaders.

As teachers, we are gaining experience with the curriculum, not only as to its content but also as to its organization - that is, how much time it requires for these teaching courses.

During the year, three new textbooks have been added to the school library. These textbooks are written, not only to serve the present and future purposes of the School, but also with the thought in mind of a future correspondence school.

During 1959, at the request of the Educational Committee, Ruth Burton has made a very thorough study of correspondence schools and has possessed herself of a very valuable collection of data and information which will be of service to us later on. There does not seem to be a real call for a correspondence school at the present time. A note asking for response from those who would be interested in a correspondence school only brought two inquiries.

During the year the Committee held regular monthly meetings, and continuous study and consideration has been given to the welfare of the School and possibilities of improving the curriculum.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

One meeting of the Committee was held on October 28, 1959, for the purpose of drafting the budget for the year of 1960. The comparison of the Treasurer's memo accounts of the various committees' actual expenses to date against their budgets revealed an over-all expense for the year Mere than the budget estimate. Whereas several committees reduced the amounts of their estimated budget expense for the coming year, the materially increased expenses anticipated by others caused the total to increase to \$6,425 as compared with \$5,700 for 1959.

As in the past, the practice has been continued of limiting the solicitation of funds to the active membership of the Brotherhood. As of December 31, 1959, the result of the letter solicitation shows total pledges for 1959 of approximately \$5,250.50of which \$4,792.50has been paid. This compares with a total of \$5,600 pledged for 1958. 184 letters were sent out covering 245 individuals plus 57 additional letters sent in three bulk shipments to other Urantia Societies.

According to the practice instituted last year, the books will again be audited as of December 31, 1959, by Olga DuVal, accountant.

On December 16, 1959, we finally received notice of our tax exempt status.

The Secretary-General's office has been the usual interesting spot this last year. In fact, it seems to get more interesting all the time. Not only is there close contact with all the societies and individuals within the societies, but also with persons who write in for information, or come in person to call on us. Those who come in the daytime meet Anne Rawson, Edith Cook, and Dr. Sadler. But there have been several very interesting interviews in the evening or weekends in which I've participated with Doctor.

We've had a number of visits from Bud Kagan, the President of the West Coast Urantia Society, and two visits from Oklahoma people -- first, Mary Kathryn and Bill Grisso, the President of the Oklahoma society, and later, Berkeley Elliott, the Secretary of the Oklahoma Society, Helen and Van Butler, and for the second time Mary Kathryn Grisso. Traffic in the other direction has not been so heavy. Ruth and Bob Burton and Al Dyon have been visitors to the West Coast group in 1959. Contacts with the Glenview group are too numerous to detail, I'm happy to say. We're very eager to promote personal contact among all the groups and hope that there will be more of it in 1960.

Besides the usual correspondence with our own people in the local societies, I have written approximately 80 letters to interested outsiders who have asked for information. These were spread over 17 states and 5 foreign countries -- England, Australia, France, Switzerland, and Egypt.

In May 1959 the Executive Committee appointed William S. Sadler, Jr., as a Field Representative to act as a personal liaison between the Executive Committee and the local societies and study groups. He visited and made reports on the societies in Oklahoma City, Los Angeles, and Glenview. For the second year we held a weeklong seminar in Los Angeles in July, which was well attended.

Official permission was finally received from the Urantia Foundation for the Brotherhood, the Corporation, and the local societies to use the Urantia symbol -three azure blue circles on a light background.

In July the Executive Committee made three Urantia Books available for loan purposes and they have all been in constantuse since then.

As many of you know, we lost three members of the General Council in 1959 -- one by resignation, Walter Parkin, and two by death, William Harrah and Clarence Bowman. Their places will be filled by election at today's meeting.

We know of a number of study groups -- Albany, Ft. Lauderdale, Ft. Worth, Darien, Wichita, Bensenville, Western Springs, Winnetka, Springfield and Chicago. Because the West Coast society is so scattered, they meet in small study groups in seven places: Cold Canyon (Bud Kagan), Pasadena and Desert Springs (the Steens), La Mirada (Gollnicks), West Los Angeles (Fendersons), Arcadia (Fred Squires), Rancho Santa Fe (Tacketts), and San Diego (Richard Squires).

Book sales have been greater this year than last and we hope that they will increase every year from now on. The trend has changed this year and in our opinion it is a healthy trend. More books are being seld through bookstores than to individuals. A look at the bookstore record is most interesting. The following figures are only for the year 1959. Sales through foreign stores are still slow — 5 stores, I each in 5 cities, in 4 countries — England, Switzerland, Australia, and Egypt. But in the United States the situation is much better. We have sold through 43 stores and mail order establishments. These were located in 29 cities in 14 states — for a total of 244 books, more than half of all the books sold in 1959.

The greatest concentration, as might be expected was in California (60 books through 7 stores), Illinois (41 books through 8 stores), and New York (34 books through 8 stores). Another heavy purchaser is a mail order business in Minnesota — 37 books in 1959. Two of the New York contacts also do a big mail order business — so the books are going out into many places we're not aware of. The map we have with the red pins is interesting, but far far from complete.

These figures do not include the bulk shipments to societies and study groups. A great many books have gone to Australia to one person for use in study groups, and of course Los Angeles, Oklahoma, and Glenview have all had bulk shipments.

We feel this is a very encouraging trend -- and are looking forward to increased sales in 1960.
