


WORSHIP

1990 International Conference

REGISTRATION

In order to have sufficient accommodations in Snowmass and have enough meals to feed everyone, we must commit to Snowmass Resort Association 30 days prior to the conference and make a large cash deposit. Therefore, we have to have your registration in by April 30, 1990. The registration fee is \$50 for adults and \$25 for children/teens 8-16. Registration fees are nonrefundable. Anyone who registers after April 30, 1990 will need to pay the late registration fee of \$75 per adult and \$37.50 per child. Please register by filling out the Registration and Meal Plan Form and mailing it with your payment to Fifth Epochal Fellowship, 529 Wrightwood Ave., Chicago, IL 60614 U.S.A.

Those of you who preregistered in 1989 will have received a photocopy of your preregistration form in your registration packet so you'll know exactly how you originally registered.

MEAL PLAN

In 1981 when we had our conference in Snowmass there was no conference center with a dining hall. We all had to eat at restaurants which were and still are very expensive. Even those people who bought groceries in Snowmass were amazed at the high cost of groceries that one pays in mountain resorts.

In 1990, however, we can enjoy our meals together on the rooftop dining room which overlooks the valley and a beautiful view of the mountains. We have negotiated long and hard for the lowest price possible for our own meal program. The price for the meal plan is only \$125 for adults and \$75 for children 5-12, this is 40% off the adult rate. Children 4 years and under eat free. This price includes all meals while you are attending the conference, 5 dinners, 4 lunches, and 5 breakfasts, Saturday dinner through Thursday breakfast. Snowmass Resort Association has agreed to donate their 15% profit margin to our meal program to help keep meal prices down without sacrificing quality. This is a wonderful gesture of goodwill on their part and we are very grateful to them.

Fifth Epochal Fellowship encourages you to purchase the meal plan, even if you are staying in condos. Because we must commit to a final number of meals and pay for them in advance, we are asking you to send in your meal plan payment by April 30, 1990. The social gathering around meals is a great way to meet new friends and catch up with old ones. Also, you will be enjoying deliciously prepared meals at a great savings. The menu includes delicious lamb chops, steaks, and chicken that were raised organically, free from chemicals. These are the highest quality meats

available. A delicious vegetarian menu is also available. Please indicate the number of vegetarians in the space provided on the Registration and Meal Plan Form. Meals are served buffet style. The meal plan also includes a Chuck Wagon Barbecue dinner with all the fixins served western style on Tuesday night, when Snowmass has their 4th of July fireworks.

LODGING

We are very fortunate to be working with Snowmass Resort Association (SRA) who will be handling our housing needs. We have worked hard in choosing the hotels and condos for our group, and have negotiated for the lowest prices possible. The hotels and condos that are available at our discounted rates are listed on the Lodging Form. The prices listed are nightly rates excluding taxes. Children 16 and under have free accommodations in their parents' room, individuals 17 years and over, pay an extra person charge of \$10. No more than 4 people are allowed in each hotel room. The condos also have restrictions on the total number of people allowed in each condo unit. Most of the condos have one bathroom per bedroom.

Room selection will be distributed on a first come, first served basis, so send your Lodging Form in early to Snowmass Resort Association, P.O. Box 5566, Snowmass Village, CO 81615 U.S.A. The number of condos are limited. You will need to list your first, second, and third choice on the Lodging Form. If none of your choices are available you will most likely be staying in one of the two large hotels, the Wildwood or the Silvertree, which are conveniently located adjacent to the Conference Center.

You must include a deposit of one night's room rate for your first choice accommodation. Mail this deposit with the Lodging Form to Snowmass Resort Association by April 30, 1990. (Do not send this form and deposit to Chicago.) You may change or cancel your reservations before May 30, directly with your hotel or condo and get a full refund minus a \$25 cancellation fee. If you cancel your room after May 30, you will forfeit your deposit unless the room is re-rented, then you'll receive your full deposit less the \$25 cancellation fee.

If you are arriving in Snowmass before June 30th or leaving later than July 5th, as are many who are attending meetings and/or the Preconference Spiritual Retreat, you can still get our special conference rates on your accommodations. Be sure to indicate your arrival and departure dates on the Lodging Form.

Since Snowmass Village is located on a hillside, there are flights of stairs between properties. If you have trouble going up and down stairs, you would probably want to stay in the Wildwood or the Silvertree. All the bedrooms in the properties are elegantly furnished with cable TV, refrigerators, etc. Because the evening temperature drops into the 50's, there is no air conditioning in any of the rooms. Most of the properties have swimming pools so be sure to bring your swimsuit.

ROOMMATES

The 1990 International Conference Planning Committee recommends that individuals, who would like a roommate in order to cut their cost for accommodations, make their own arrangements for this prior to making room reservations. However, for those people who may not know anyone to room with, we can provide the service of assigning roommates upon request. Please be advised that we will not be using any selection criteria except for gender and smoking. If you want Fifth Epochal Fellowship to put you with a roommate please check the appropriate box on the Lodging Form and enclose \$38 for one night's advance deposit for the Wildwood Hotel.

CAMPING

Camping is available approximately 20 miles outside of Snowmass. We have reserved a campground called "Difficult Campground." It is a group site that can hold up to 90 campers, 30 cars, and 5 RV's (there are no hookups for RV's). It is very rustic, with pit toilets and drinking water but **no showers**. You would have to bathe at a friend's condo or hotel room. You would need to bring all your own camping equipment. The cost is \$3 per person per night. For more information please check the box on the Registration and Meal Plan Form.

About 20 miles from Snowmass there is a KOA campground located in Basalt. It has full RV hookups, showers, flush toilets, a swimming pool, and many extras. It costs \$14 per night for 2 people in a tent, additional people are extra. RV's cost between \$16-17.50 per night for 2 people depending on hookups. TRAVEL INFORMATION

You will need to make travel arrangements directly to Aspen, Colorado. Snowmass Travel Agency is offering our group a 40% discount on full coach fares and a 5% discount on maxisaver fares on United Airlines as well as Continental. These are the only two airlines that fly into Aspen. The toll free number for Snowmass Travel Agency is 1-800-332-3245. You may want to contact your own travel agency for the best price. Flights are

often delayed from Aspen to Denver so leave plenty of time to make your connecting return flight. The Snowmass Conference Center is 8 miles from Aspen Airport. Most of the hotels and condos provide for transportation from Aspen Airport and will send a van to pick you up if you call them when you arrive at the Aspen Airport. Once you arrive in Denver you will need to take a short shuttle ride, or walk, to the gate. The Site Committee will have volunteers stationed at the airport to offer any assistance you might need. You can recognize them by their bright hats with the "Walking with God" logo.

Renting a car and driving from Denver to Aspen is a scenic experience over the Continental Divide. Aspen is about 3 ½ hours from Denver, 2 hours from Grand Junction, and 5 hours from Colorado Springs.

CHILD/TEEN CARE

In order to give parents the time to enjoy the conference without requiring them to volunteer in the Child Care Program, we have developed a comprehensive child care program. There are three child care programs being offered at the 1990 International Conference: Infant Care, Children 3-12 years old, and Teens. Because of regulations governing child care, Fifth Epochal Fellowship has enlisted the services of a professional child care program for children aged 3-12. Sunbunnies/Adventure Camp has been offering quality supervision with a stimulating program of activities and arts for children in Snowmass for 14 years.

Cost for Child Care - Fifth Epochal Fellowship has decided to subsidize the cost of this program for children 3-12 by paying 40% of the cost for each child. The cost to parents for infant child care and the teen program are also at a reduced rate. Child care will be provided during the hours of the conference program sessions. Morning Sessions are 9:00am to 12:15pm and Afternoon Sessions are 3:00pm to 6:00pm. The subsidized rates are as follows: The Full Time Rate is \$68 for all 9 sessions for the week (4 ½ days). The Part Time Rate is \$45 for your choice of 5 morning or afternoon sessions. You may choose which sessions you want when you register at the Conference Center on June 30, 1990. Be advised that if you choose to sign up for the Part Time Rate you may not get your first choice of the sessions you want. The part time rate is for parents who need flexibility, but there is a savings if you sign up for the full time rate. We cannot guarantee there will be space in the Child Care Program for walkins.

Please mail your Child Care Form with payment to Fifth Epochal Fellowship by April 30, 1990.

The Teen Program cost is a flat rate of \$25 for the week. This covers the Teen Program and the fee for use of the Teen Center.

Refund Policy - Your child care payment will be fully refunded if you cancel before May 15, 1990.

Sunbunnies and Adventure Camp - A summertime experience your child will remember. Children 3 years old through 12 years old will be cared for by Snowmass Adventure Camps. They will be setting up a program in the Wildwood Hotel especially designed for our conference around an International Week theme. This professional, on-site program has been providing arts, crafts, dramatics, dance, sports, swim lessons, and nature experiences to children visiting Snowmass for over 14 years.

Infant Care - Children 0-3 years old will be cared for in small groups by qualified and caring staff hired by Fifth Epochal Fellowship. These nurseries will be located in properties close to the Conference Center.

Teen Program - In addition to the local recreation activities, the Child Care Committee will be setting up a chaperoned Teen Center for 13 -18 year olds. This center (located in the Mountain Chalet Hotel) includes a large lounge with a pool table, a deck for relaxing and socializing, a Media Center with a lending library and computer games arcade, and meeting rooms for discussion groups. A study program, a teen dance, and possibly a lifeguarded pool are being organized.

Parent Participation - Volunteering time in a Child Care area will not be required to ensure adequate supervision of children. However, parents are always welcome to visit and are invited to stay until their child is comfortable, or just to join the fun.

Private Child Care Arrangements - Private arrangements used by past conference attendees include bringing a personal sitter along, leaving children at home with a sitter, or cooperative care with another family. Teens may be available to babysit. Many of the hotel day maids will babysit during the evening hours at a rate of \$6 or \$8 per hour. The front desk of the hotels will help connect parents with sitters. Other Snowmass daycare providers include Little Feet Infant Care (303-923-1548) and Snowmass Super Sitters (303-923-6080).

ACTIVITIES

Snowmass/Aspen is a recreational wonderland with lots of opportunities for summertime fun with your family, old friends, and the new friends you'll definitely meet. We've negotiated discounted group rates for the activities listed below. The Village Concierge is an organization located in Snowmass that will be making the arrangements and reservations for these activities. Please use the "Activities Form" to sign up, space is limited. You will need to pay by check or money order made payable to "The Village Concierge," or use your Mastercard or Visa. A deposit of 50% of your total

amount is required. The "Activities Form" and your deposit must be received by June 1, 1989. The remaining balance will be paid at on-site registration on Saturday, June 30. For your convenience you may include your Activities Form and deposit in the same envelope that you are mailing to Snowmass Resort Association (SRA) with your "Lodging Form."

Whitewater Raft Trip - The Colorado River provides a great half day river trip. It is a combination of delightful rapids, interspersed with calm water stretches. The trip is highlighted by a roller coaster ride through "South Canyon Rapids." It is suitable for first time rafters, families with children (as young as six), and anyone who wants a fun, moderate river trip. The trip is scheduled for Monday, July 2 from 1:30 to 6:00. Prices: \$35 for Adults and \$30 for Children 6 to 15. The raft trip is limited to 250 people.

Glenwood Hot Springs - A huge pool fed from mineral hot springs provides fun for the whole family. A scenic bus ride through the mountains will take you to this popular spot. This trip is scheduled for Tuesday, July 3 from 1:30 to 6:00. Prices: \$19.00 for Adults and \$17.00 for Children.

Bring your swimsuit.

Two Hour Horseback Trailride - Scenic views of Snowmass and Aspen on well-groomed trails. Gentle horses. This is offered on two days Sunday, July 1 from 1:00 to 3:00 and on Wednesday, July 4 from 1:00 to 3:00. Prices: \$22 for Adults and Children 8 years or over and 42" tall.

Walking / Shopping Tour of Aspen - Aspen is alive with activity on July 4th when we'll be walking and shopping in downtown Aspen. It is a beautiful city to enjoy. The city bus fare is approximately \$3.00 for the round trip. There is no other charge for this activity which will be Wednesday, July 4 from 1:30 to 4:30. You need to reserve this in advance so that we will know how many are going.

Gondola Ride - From the base of Aspen Mountain, the Silver Queen, the world's longest single stage, vertical rise gondola travels to the 11,212 foot summit in 15 minutes. It runs daily and costs \$10.00 for Adults and \$6.00 for Children 3 to 12. Children 2 and under are free. The city bus to Aspen lets you off a few yards from the lift. The bus fare is approximately

\$3.00 round trip.

Other Activities - swimming, golf, tennis, hiking, fishing, and of course star-gazing are all available in Snowmass. The Village Concierge offers a number of other activities such as: Downhill Bicycle Tour, Backcountry Jeep Tour, Scenic Airplane Ride, Llama Treks, Half Day Fly Fishing, Hot Air Ballooning and more. You can make arrangements for these by contacting The Village Concierge, P.O. Box 5929, Snowmass Village, CO 81615, telephone: (303) 923-5400.

"Walking with God" is the overall theme of the conference. We will explore this through the presentations of experienced individuals willing to share their personal understandings of, and reflections upon, those habits which favor religious growth. Those habits, as stated on page 1095 of The Urantia Book, are: "(1) cultivated sensitivity to divine values, (2) recognition of religious living in others, (3) reflective meditation on cosmic meanings, (4) worshipful problem solving, (5) sharing one's spiritual life with one's fellows, (6) avoidance of selfishness, (7) refusal to presume on divine mercy, and (8) living as in the presence of God."

In an attempt to simplify our often over-scheduled lives, we have decided to make the presentations available in several large group formats that will not require signing up for workshops. For an outline of the program schedule, please see the Program Calendar included in the registration

packet.

TRANSLATIONS

We look forward to hosting readers of The Urantia Book from many countries. In order to meet the translation needs of our guests, the International Committee is planning to provide translations of the presentations through the use of headphones, translators, and translated texts. The International Committee is looking for interpreters for French, Spanish and Finnish. Those interested please sign up on the Volunteer Form included in your Registration Packet.

WORSHIP

The incredible natural beauty of the Rocky Mountains is conducive to prayer, thanksgiving and worship opportunities. Meditation/worship gatherings are scheduled in the morning 7:00-7:30 and early evening 6:00-6:30 each day. Worship walks will also be scattered throughout the program. A worship service will take place at the top of Aspen Mountain for those who take the gondola ride. The conference will conclude with a thanksgiving worship service for all.

ENTERTAINMENT

The performing arts can be just as uplifting an experience as a stirring lecture, a silent walk in the woods, or an inspiring text. Music, poetry, drama, comedy, dance, and multi-media presentations are all planned for an enthralling evening program. Professional entertainers as well as talented

conference participants will blend their talents to make for an enriching experience. Late evening entertainment and socializing can be found at our "Club UB" (back by popular demand, after being such a hit at the 1987 Conference in Maine). If you have talents you would like to share please check the appropriate box on the Volunteer Form included in your Registration Packet.

VOLUNTEER SERVICE

A wide variety of current publications of interest to readers is now available. If you wish to display work of high quality at the Conference, please fill out the space provided on the Volunteer Form. No sales of publications will be permitted at the Conference. You may, however, give away free literature, and provide a sign-up sheet along with your materials.

COMMON INTEREST GROUPS

Our conference will bring together a considerable variety of readers from many walks of life. Within the larger group of readers there may be a number of interests in common for small groups to consider. Therefore, an invitation is made to those who feel that these common interests need an opportunity for expression and discussion, to meet during the open periods of the afternoon schedule.

We want to distinguish common interest groups from those variously organized not-for-profit organizations whose philosophical basis is founded on *The Urantia Book*. The common interest groups might be formed by individuals who share such bonds as: those who are single parents, divorced, health professionals, clergy, interested in women's issues, men's issues, same-sex relationship issues, career issues, self help groups, one spouse reads The Urantia Book but the other does not, etc...

THE ROCKY MOUNTAIN EXPERIENCE AND YOUR HEALTH

Medical Considerations: Snowmass is nestled into the Rockies at an elevation of 8,100 feet (2500 meters) above sea level. In addition to spectacular birdseye views, this means that there is less oxygen in the air. Some people, especially those of you coming from sea level, may experience some effects of this change in altitude for a day or so. People with heart conditions, or who otherwise suspect the altitude might affect their health, should check with their doctors. There will be a full-time registered nurse present throughout the conference and oxygen available at several locations.

Wheelchair Access: The Conference Center is equipped with elevators. Two of the hotels, the Wildwood and the Silvertree are connected to the conference center by ramps and each has elevators as well.

Clothing: Although you can expect warm sunny days with highs in the 90's, bring a sweater or jacket for the evenings when temperatures can be in the 50's. Because it gets so cool in the evening, none of the accommodations have air conditioning. Bring comfortable shoes for hiking, a swimming suit for the many pools available, sunglasses, sunscreen, and be prepared for possible afternoon showers.

COMMEMORATIVE T-SHIRTS AND HATS

The Child Care Program needs donations to help fund it so that we can all have a better conference. In order to subsidize the child care program, Fifth Epochal Fellowship will be selling commemorative T-shirts and hats. These will be sold at the conference. The T-shirts have the theme "Walking with God" in several languages printed on the back and the conference logo on the front pocket. They come in various sizes and colors. The hats are in neon colors and also have the conference logo. All money from the sale of the T-shirts and hats will go to help fund the Child Care Program.

Pre-Conference Spiritual Retreat

Dallas Fellowship and The Circles magazine are presenting a preconference Spiritual Retreat called "Adventures In Spiritual Living" which will explore techniques for achieving a personal spiritual relationship with God. Participants will be sharing their Inner selves and their spiritual lives with each other. Experience and sharing will be the major approach. This is the same program presented at Mo Ranch at Hunt, Texas in October 1989 where it was extremely effective in evoking an awareness of God's presence. It is a spiritually exciting program.

The retreat will start Thursday evening, June 28, 1990 at 7:30 PM and end Saturday, June 30 at noon. Participation is limited to approximately 100 persons. No child care is available, and because of the need for concentration, children are not included in the scheduled retreat activities. For information on Private Child Care arrangements read the Information Booklet, Your lodging reservations for the conference can be changed to include the pre-conference spiritual retreat. Please do not arrange for the extra 2 days lodging until you receive notification that you are registered for the pre-conference retreat. Meals during the retreat must be secured on your own. There are many restaurants nearby. There will be a registration fee of \$27.00. MEDICAL EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Snowmass is nestled in the Rockies at an elevation of 8,100 feet (2500 meters) above sea level, therefore, there is less oxygen in the air. Some people, especially those of you coming from sea level, may experience some effects of this change in altitude for a day or so. There is a full-time registered nurse, Peach Morrison, stationed at the Hotel Wildwood, Room #143 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, and 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. daily. Peach will be available at any other time as well, but you will need to inquire at the front desk of the Hotel Wildwood for her whereabouts. Look for the red cross on her door. Along with first aid supplies, she has oxygen available for anyone who needs it.

There will be an Information/Hospitality Center set up in the Sinclair Room throughout the Conference.

You need to check in at the Activities table at on-site registration to make sure that you are on the list for any of the activities below that you are signed up for and to pay your remaining balance. For further Activities information, call the Village Concierge at 923-5400.

We have added another day for the Walking/Shopping Tour of Aspen on Sunday from 1:30 to 4:30. If you reserved a place in the Walking/Shopping Tour, you must stop by the activities table to choose the day you are going (Sunday or Wednesday) and pay the \$6.00 chartered round trip bus fare. (The 4th of July is one of the most festive days in Aspen, so if you want to avoid crowds, sign up for the trip on Sunday.)

For each of the following activities, BOARD THE BUS IN FRONT OF THE CONFERENCE CENTER 15 MINUTES BEFORE the scheduled times listed below.
