

IC96 & Daily Life

IC96 is offering a wide variety of workshops and discussion groups in the mornings, afternoons, and evenings. These meetings have been listed in this program to help you select from the various course offerings. There will be no sign-up sheet for any of these workshops. Please use this program to identify the course presenters, topics, and locations for the workshops you plan to attend.

Registration

Please wear your name badge at all times, as it is your ticket to conference events. When you register, be sure that you have picked up your Tuesday tour tickets and signed up for your box lunch at the Navi-Hopi desk and that you have enrolled children in the appropriate youth program.

Housing

On-campus conference attendees will stay at Ridge and McConnell halls. Both are equipped with coin-operated laundry facilities. Check-in is after 1 p.m. Check-out includes leaving the room in good condition and stopping by the front desk at the hall to return keys and meal cards. There will be a \$20 fee for lost room keys and \$30 for an outside key. Linen service includes two sheets, one blanket, pillow and case, and one washcloth and towel. Linens will be changed Tuesday.

Rooms in Ridge Hall are equipped with telephones. Local calls are free; long-distance calls require calling card. To receive calls, the Ridge desk is (510) 523-2790 and the staff will provide the caller your phone number.

Pay phones are in the lobby of McConnell Hall. To receive calls, the campus operator's number is (510) 523-9011. The caller should ask for McConnell Hall and staff will take messages and post them in the lobby.

Parking

Free parking is available on campus for conference participants. Parking permits will be issued upon check-in. The permits are valid at most lots on campus.

Meals

Cafeteria-style meals will be served in the duBois Center. Meal times are: breakfast, 6:30 to 8:30 a.m.; lunch, 12 noon to 2 p.m. (except Thursday, 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.); and dinner, 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Thursday's dinner will be served at the Country Fair.

On-campus registrants will be issued a meal card at registration. The card is valid only in the duBois dining hall. Replacement of a lost card is \$5. The meal package begins on day of arrival (either Friday night dinner or Saturday night dinner) and continues through Friday breakfast (following conclusion of IC96).

Off-campus registrants may purchase meals on a permeal basis. The special Thursday night meal at the Country Fair must be purchased at registration.

If you plan to participate in the bus tour on Tuesday, be sure to order a box lunch at the time of registration for IC96. Those remaining on campus will observe the usual meal schedule.

IC96 Workshop Series

C96 will feature two intensive workshop series on important topics that represent many years of research among our readership. These workshop series will start with a morning program and be followed by afternoon and evening discussion groups. Familiarity with concepts presented in *The Urantia Book* on these topics is recommended.

Patterns of The Universe

Universal pattern, as described in *The Urantia Book*, is as conceptually unique as the Supreme, the ascension career, and the morontia life. Pattern is Source, and Source supplies the unifying principle/energy/dynamic of all life. Pattern offers many signposts shining through every aspect of our lives, as it waits to be discovered. We are made of both Pattern from a spiritual source and patterns in material form.

Our relationships, customs, history, visual arts and music, mathematics and science all contain patterns. Paradoxically, such patterns all around us are not Pattern and yet they contain it. Since the Isle of Paradise is the nucleus of every ultimaton, Pattern does pervade all space, including material copies.

In becoming more sensitive to patterns and the Pattern that lies behind them, we can gain deeper insight into *The Urantia Book's* revealed overview of a great master universe, and into the significance of that gigantic, harmonious, interlocking design for our own lives here and now.

Presenters will examine different aspects of Pattern as spiritual source and patterns as its copies: mandalas, sacred geometry and art, designs in nature, and macro and micro levels of the cosmos. There will be slide presentations, handouts, and live music.

The two afternoon sessions are for adults only and will be limited to those who have attended the morning program. The evening session is open to all.

IC96 Conference Reader Services

Berkeley Elliott International Center

The Berkeley Elliott International Center, located in the Agassiz room at duBois, will serve as a resource center for international attendees and readers with international interests. Sponsored by the Urmia Foundation and the First Society of Oklahoma in memory of a long-time international explorer for *The Urantia Book*, "Berk's Place" will display selected works from Berkeley's art collection as well as many photos from international trips she organized. The Center will offer translation facilitation for conversation as well as video playback of speeches and workshops for study by those for whom English is a second language. The Center will also host daily worship, a series of sessions entitled "International Perspectives," slide shows, and receptions for international guests. Check schedule board for information.

Club UB

Readers can gather at the duBois Ballroom each evening in a coffeehouse atmosphere over coffee, tea, and soft drinks to enjoy conversation together. Low-key entertainment will be featured. At 10 p.m. the entertainment will gear up for dancing, and beer and wine will be available with prepurchased tickets from the IC96 Store. Entertainment will be provided by a house band of professional musicians and talented readers. A magician will also perform in the audience. Tuesday night: Skits from Oklahoma City; Wednesday night: Dance party. Check entertainment board for daily featured performers.

Computer Lab

A computer lab, located in the South Learning Resource Center with 18 workstations linked to the Internet, will be freely available to attendees each day between 2:30 and 4:30 p.m. Experienced individuals will be on hand to introduce new users to the Internet, to discuss reader services available electronically, and to examine the future of Internet-related technologies and the growing readership community.

An E-mail address has been provided for the conference, allowing readers unable to attend to send and receive messages. Stop by and participate in extending IC96 to the far corners of Urantia. Check your E-mail, learn how to search the web, share your favorite web sites, learn about IRC chat and the various on-line *Urantia* Book-related discussion forums.

IC96 Program Overview

The program will begin promptly at 9 a.m. in the Ballroom at the duBois Center with a 15-minute worship session followed by an inspirational speaker. Since comprehensive childcare is provided, plenary sessions are intended for adults. Four concurrent workshops will follow the plenary sessions. Local and international speakers will explore the daily theme with presentations for beginning to advanced *Urantia Book* readers.

A variety of discussion groups will meet in the afternoons. In addition, many outdoor activities have been organized for young and old alike. In the evenings, conference attendees will have a choice of worship experiences. Evening workshops will also be held.

There will be no sign-up sheets for attending workshops. Please use this program booklet to make decisions on which events you will attend.

IC96 Store

The IC96 store and art gallery is located in the Freemont room at duBois. Store hours are 12 noon to 6 p.m. each day, except Tuesday. In addition to products available from Good Cheer, another 20 vendors will be selling their items.

Information Center

The communications center for IC96 will be located inside the main entrance of duBois Center. You are invited to leave and pick up messages here or post a notice to announce special meetings. A schedule of rooms available for use by common-interest groups will be posted.

Teen Center

Teens (13-17) will meet in the Peaks lounge at 9 a.m. and divide into two groups. One group will experience the Ropes Challenge course on Sunday and the other will hike, visit Indian ruins, and participate in rites of passage. The groups will then switch these activities on Monday. After dinner, all teens will be able to play basketball, volleyball, ping pong, board games, swim, or

watch movie videos.

On Monday and Wednesday from 9 p.m. to 12 midnight, IC96 will feature Club UBTeen at the University Union building. These evenings will include music by a D.J., food and soft drinks.

There are no scheduled activities at the Teen Center on Tuesday. The teen program will end at lunch on Thursday.

Toddler Room

Childcare is provided for children four and under in the basement of the duBois Center in Rooms 28 and 29. In addition, supervised trips to an outdoor play yard and the older children's program are planned.

The Toddler Room will be open each morning and afternoon (except for Tuesday) from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. Childcare is also provided each evening during the worship service, from 6:45 to 8:15 p.m. Please review the schedule posted at the Toddler Room for Thursday afternoon's schedule and any changes.

Parent cooperative childcare will be available after 8:15 p.m. and during Club UB. Specific times and locations will be posted on the information board at the Toddler Room.

Parents, please sign up for two hours of volunteer time, if you have not already done so. On Saturday, August 3rd, sign-up sheets will be at the registration table and the Toddler Room. All adults are also welcome to help out.

Tuesday Tours

Be sure you have picked up tickets and requested a box lunch for your bus tour when you register.

For those going on the Glen Canyon/Colorado River float trip, report to the south side of the parking lot by Lumberjack Dome Stadium at 7 a.m. This is located east of the duBois Center. The bus leaves between 7:15 and 7:30 a.m. and is expected to return 12 hours later.

The other three bus tours (Grand Canyon National Park; Oak Creek Canyon, Sedona, Jerome & Montezuma Castle; Petrified Forest, Painted Desert, Meteor Crater) will load at the south side of the parking lot by Lumber-jack Dome Stadium at 7:15 a.m. The buses leave between 7:30 and 7:45 a.m. and are expected back 8 hours later.

Worship & Meditation

IC96 will provide more variety than ever before to our worshipful experience of divinity. Each morning prior to the plenary speaker, there will be 20 minutes of worship ranging from an American Indian dance experience to East Indian (Himou) to classical harp and song. Afternoon sessions will provide practical, hands-on workshops about worship. And in the evenings, worship opportunities will vary, some with audiovisuals or songs and others focusing on pure science.

Room C in the duBois Center will be dedicated to silent worship and meditation throughout the conference.

Youth Center (5-12)

Children explore life through their senses: touching, seeing, hearing, moving, smelling, and feeling. The 5-12 year olds will have an opportunity each morning (8:30 a.m. to 12:15 p.m.) at IC96 to explore what life was like in the days of Jesus. As they enter the "Jerusalem Marketplace" tent, they may put on a costume, fill their pouches with gold "coins," and explore any of 15 different areas which could have been found in a village 2,000 years ago.

There will be a variety of activities for kids and adults from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. At 3 p.m. on Thursday, all the children will lead a processional for the Closing Community Celebration prior to the Country Fair.

Evening activities (6:30 to 10:30) on Sunday, Monday, and Wednesday in the Youth Center, located in the Lounge and Room 30 in the basement of duBois, include art, games, ping pong, and videos. A schedule of activities will be available at the kids' registration table.

Parents, all 5-12 year olds are expected to participate in the program or they are to be with their parents or a designated adult. Each parent is requested to sign up at the registration table to volunteer two hours at the Youth Center. All adults are also welcome to help out.



The Racial Legacy of the Global Family

The intensive series on race will examine the concept of race as it is developed in *The Urantia Book*. There will be a total of three sessions, each of which can be attended as a complete session or as part of the series.

The series begins with a morning workshop led by David Kantor. In this session, attendees will be given tools to examine their own attitudes toward contemporary racial issues and it will include an overview of the evolutionary process detailed in *The Urantia Book* along with a look at the field of population genetics and the state of racial concerns on a global scale.

The second session will consist of talks by Matthew Block and Charles Olivea. Block will review The Urantia Book's presentation of the dynamics of racial difference and explore two agendas of planetary progress: survival of the fittest and survival of the faithful. Olivea will present his speculative metaphysics of race, with the premise that race is a biological governor permitting various potentials of body, mind, and spirit to emerge on the finite stage of planetary existence and how race seems to be part of a cosmic design which Deity uses to create evolutionary tension in finite creature growth.

The final session will consist of a presentation by Kermit Anderson and a panel discussion open to the audience. Anderson will help us understand the difference between the simplistic view of genetics propagated by mass media as contrasted with the much greater complexities faced by researchers and ethicists.



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

Pre-conference retreats



Each day will be divided into three parts, allowing us to focus on aspects of living that form a dynamic whole.



ROOM and MEALS

The conference will be held at Northern Arizona University. The dormitory reserved for our exclusive use has two twin beds per room with a bathroom and shower down the hall. We also have limited space in a second dormitory set up with two rooms (two twin beds each) sharing a common bathroom. These are being reserved for families on a first come, first served basis. We have secured enough beds for 1100 people; those who register late will need to either camp or stay at a nearby motel. Information for alternative lodging options will be sent with your registration confirmation packet upon request.

The adult rate of \$49 per day includes three meals and linens. Children 8–17 will be \$32 per day; children seven and under are free! For those staying on campus, NAU offers a room and meals package only, which includes meals from Saturday night through Thursday night. For those staying off campus, single meals can be purchased on campus.

REGISTRATION



LOCATION

Flagstaff is located 146 miles north of Phoenix at the intersection of Interstates 17 and 40. The city of 47,000 sits at 7,000 feet, at the center of a great hub of ancient Native American enclaves, pine-carpeted peaks, and a varied expanse of mountains, rivers, canyons, and lakes.


With an average temperature of 80° F (23° C) in summer, Flagstaff attracts many visitors during the peak tourist season—August. Afternoon thundershowers can be expected. Exciting storms and moderate summer temperatures promise a stimulating weather experience.

RECREATION

Flagstaff is surrounded by the Coconino National Forest, a 1.8 million-acre wonderland with more than 320 miles of hiking trails. The San Francisco Peaks are another of Flagstaff's prominent natural assets; Humphrey's Peak at an elevation of 12,643 feet is the highest point in Arizona. In downtown Flagstaff visit the 1926 Monte Vista Hotel, the Museum of Northern Arizona, the Coconino Center for the Arts, and the world-famous Lowell Observatory.

Nearby attractions include Wupatki National Monument with more than 800 ancient Indian ruins, Meteor Crater where a giant crater fell to earth 50,000 years ago, Oak Creek Canyon which Rand McNally Road Atlas lists as among "the great American road trips," and of course, the Grand Canyon!





TUESDAY TOURS

We have planned some fantastic tours for those of you who would like to see the beauty of Arizona on our free day, Tuesday August 6: There will be an all-day Grand Canyon sightseeing tour; an Oak Creek Canyon/Sedona/Montezuma Castle tour; a Petrified Forest / Painted Desert tour; and for the more adventurous, a Colorado River Float Trip. Most of these tours are half price for children 5–15 and free for children under five. Complete information and registration forms will be sent with your conference registration confirmation—just check the Tuesday Tours box on the registration form.

TRANSPORTATION

Those flying into Phoenix will have the option to reserve a seat on a Navi-Hopi bus for the 2–1/2 hour drive to the conference site in Flagstaff. The cost is \$40 per adult round trip or \$25 one-way; children 5–15 are half price and children 4 and under are free. Registration will be handled directly by Navi-Hopi. Forms will be sent with your registration confirmation packet. Reservations need to be made by June 25th to ensure a seat.

The Pullium Airport is located four miles south of Flagstaff. Flagstaff is also served by the Greyhound/Trailways bus service (1-800-231-2222) and Amtrak railroad (1-800-872-7245).
