Christy has referred to me your request for several Urantia pins, since this is a Brotherhood matter. The request was discussed at the Executive Committee meeting and I was requested to tell you that there are certain restrictions on selling the pins and we would have to have more details on making them available to you for your friends. We consider it an honor to be able to wear a pin and they are not for sale to everyone who requests them. If and when you can give us more details about Mr. Trachsler and we can be sure of his wholehearted dedication to the teachings of the book, it would be possible for him to buy a pin. By the way, the price is \$3.50 for either the pin or the lapel button.

The quarterly report to the Foundation is very interesting, especially the interview you gave on television in Geneva. As far as we know the book has been discussed on radio or television only a time or two, by individuals interested in selling the book, and nothing has been authorized by headquarters. The broadcasts apparently did not produce much in the way of tangible results.

Our current News Letter will be devoted largely to the Triennial Delegate Assembly and will crowd out your television interview, but we will keep it in mind for the future.
