URANTIA BROTHERHOOD CELEBRATES 25th ANNIVERSARY

January 2, 1980, marked the 25th anniversary of the signing of the URANTIA Brotherhood Constitution and the formation of the organization concerned with the dissemination of the teachings of *The URANTIA Book* to the world. On this day in Chicago in 1955, 36 people composing the first General Council of URANTIA Brotherhood met and signed the constitutional document which had been drafted and prepared over a period of many years. The Constitution was brought into force immediately upon signing, and officers and committee members were selected that day in accordance with its provisions.

Many years of quiet waiting were over for the Forum, the membership group which under close supervision and control had studied and nurtured the URANTIA Papers for more than 20 years before publication. The teachings of The URANTIA Book could be made public. Now final preparations for the manufacture of The URANTIA Book could begin, although it was not until October 12, 1955 before the first printing was actually completed. Members of the Forum never previously had personal copies, but had to read from a typed manuscript checked out to them by Christy for reading, and then returned while still at 533 Diversey Parkway.

Copies of *The URANTIA Book* could now be made available, not only for Forum members but also for the general public. After many years of waiting, Forum members could now enjoy their own personal copies and also could now discuss the teachings with other non-Forum members, which they were previously forbidden to do as one of the prerequisites for membership in the Forum.

To honor our anniversary, this issue of URANTIA Brotherhood Bulletin is devoted to a historical study, mainly through photographs, of the first 25 years of the public dissemination of the URANTIA teachings, and includes one page about the even earlier days of the Forum.

The development of URANTIA Brotherhood would seem in its general aspects to conform to the plans and expectations of the early leaders of the URANTIA movement. Growth has been unostentatious and undramatic, while at the same time being steady and vigorous. URANTIA Brotherhood is composed of 13 individual URANTIA societies; one of these, the Rocky Mountain URANTIA Society of Denver, has just been installed and will be reported on in the

next issue. In addition there are approximately 200 study groups known to us in the world. (These various groups have regularly been a focus of previous issues of the Bulletin. We regret that space limits us from including them in this issue.) We are further aware that there are many study groups which have never become known to us at headquarters but which nevertheless contribute to the world growth of the URANTIA movement. Approximately 100,000 copies of The URANTIA Book are abroad in the world today. These figures may not be spectacular but they would be encouraging to many of the early leaders for whom even the printing of the first copy of The URANTIA Book was the culmination of many years of effort. For a long time, the members of the Forum read, studied, socialized the teachings within their closed group, and developed ideas regarding organizations to foster the advancement of the URANTIA teachings. In 1955, many of their efforts came to fruition with the formation of URANTIA Brotherhood and the publication of The URANTIA Book.

The first "Quarterly News Letter" from the Executive Committee, which would later become known as URANTIA Brotherhood Bulletin, was issued on July 5, 1955, and con-

sisted of one page which reported on the founding of URANTIA Brotherhood.

Several paragraphs are worth presenting once again here:

"Our deliberations and legislative acts are no secret. Hence, periodically, we shall present this news letter giving you a brief account of our activities, committee functions, and a resume of our deliberations and decisions. Already numerous problems have presented themselves, from obtaining stationery and record books to the matter of granting charters to Urantia Societies, and though we are one in purpose and united in goal, our reasoning on many matters is greatly diversified. We are learning the inestimable value of group thinking.

"On January 2 in addition to the launching of the Brotherhood, the Trustees of the Urantia Foundation formally announced and signed their 'Declaration of Intention' to print the Urantia Book. Accordingly, on February II, the necessary steps were taken to begin the actual publication of the book. Let us be thankful for this interval between the formal beginning of the Brotherhood and that fast approaching day when the Word will be made Book.

"We are in motion. We may make mistakes, but, . . . may they be new and original ones. We covet the Father's guidance, but it is difficult to steer or guide anything unless it is moving in some direction."

Twenty-five years later, we are still in motion, still coveting the Father's guidance as the Brotherhood ship steers out upon the high seas of evolutionary destiny.

SERVICE RECORD OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL

The General Council is the highest governing body of URANTIA Brotherhood. It is the original 36 members comprising the first General Council who brought the Brotherhood into existence. From this Council, officers and committee chairmen are selected, thus composing the Executive Committee which conducts the day-to-day business affairs of the Brotherhood. In the first 25 years, a total of 87 people either have served or now serve on the General Council. In honor of their service, this entire list of people is presented below. Names are in alphabetical order and those with asterisks have served continuously from the founding of URANTIA Brotherhood to the present day.

SPECIAL AWARDS

A handful of people have received special recognition for their steadfast service in the early years of URANTIA Brotherhood. The Van Award is the highest award which the Brotherhood can bestow and is given for very special and loyal service in the face of difficulty. Only two have been awarded. Dr. William S. Sadler received the Van Award in 1970, and it was for him that the award was first devised. Emma L. Christensen (Christy) received the Van Award in 1973 at the Fourth Triennial Delegate Assembly. At that same time, Citations were awarded to five other dedicated workers, Edith Cook, Anne Rawson, Marian Rowley, Leone Sadler, and posthumously to Alvin L. Kulieke. Citations were awarded to Julia Fenderson and Ruth Renn in July, 1976, at the Fifth Triennial Delegate Assembly.

FORUM DAYS

Several hundred people were exposed to the teachings of the URANTIA Papers in the years before publication, although at any one time, the number of regular students of the Forum was substantially smaller - around 60-75. Forum members were, under close supervision, able to study the URANTIA Papers at 533 Diversey Parkway, now our headquarters building, in the years before publication. They were not allowed to take away notes with them, let alone any copy of the typewritten manuscript. The manuscript was carefully checked out to them for their individual study only while at 533 Diversey Parkway. Regular weekly meetings were held on Sunday afternoons and evening classes were also held at various times for more intensive study. The main times for socialization were the picnics which were held annually or sometimes twice in one summer. These gatherings are very fondly remembered and were noted as occasions of inspiration as well as socialization. They were attended by as many as 100 people and perhaps may be thought of as one of the early forerunners of our modern day conferences. They were occasions for the entire family, including children.

Nearly all available photographs of the period were taken at the picnics, hence this page focuses on these events.

STUDY SESSIONS, CONFERENCES, AND TRIENNIALS

Many of the memorable occasions to be noted in the first 25 years of the URANTIA movement are the early study sessions, later the conferences, and, regularly every three years since 1964, the gatherings at Triennial Delegate Assemblies. The first Summer Study Session, lasting three days, was held in 1963. Six summer study sessions were held in the

span of a decade from 1963 to 1972. These sessions were held on the second floor of 533 Diversey and attended by approximately 90—120 people. Thereafter, the much more widely attended conferences took their place, and conference formats have undergone steady evolution since 1973, URANTIA Brotherhood held conferences at Kendall College in Evanston in 1974 and 1975 attended by 300—400 people. A general conference was held in Lake Geneva in 1978 attracting almost 600 students. Meanwhile regional conferences, many of them substantial in size, have proliferated in the last decade.

Triennial Delegate Assemblies, part of the regular constitutional process of URANTIA Brotherhood, began in 1964. The
constitution specified that these assemblies would begin at
that time, nine years after the inauguration of the
Brotherhood. For the one and only time, delegates from the
various URANTIA societies elected all 36 members to the
General Council. They were elected in staggered terms so
that all subsequent assemblies would elect one-third of this
governing body. The sixth Triennial was just held last summer. In the early years, the Triennial gatherings brought
together many of the same people who attended the summer study sessions. Both were regularly held at 533 Diversey
and were occasions that left time for considerable socialization among the participants.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

International spread of the URANTIA teachings started almost immediately after publication of *The URANTIA Book* with the donation in 1956 of 100 books to various libraries outside the United States by the International Fellowship Committee (then named Foreign Extension Committee). The recipients were five English-speaking countries of the world: Canada, Australia, Great Britain, South Africa, and New Zealand. Over the past 25 years, the international sale and distribution of *The URANTIA Book* has generally been heaviest among these countries. Many other donations of books, by URANTIA Brotherhood, URANTIA Foundation, as well as by individual readers, have over the years helped to place the book in more than 70 nations and territories of the world. More than 5000 copies of *The URANTIA Book* are in countries outside the United States.

The international placement of *The URANTIA Book* throughout the world is a high priority of the International Fellowship Committee. The next issue of the Bulletin will feature an article on the placement of URANTIA Books in libraries in many other countries.

Pockets of readers have arisen and study group activity has occurred in a number of non-English-speaking areas including Finland, France, Belgium, Quebec, Canada; the Netherlands, Italy, India, and Colombia. A URANTIA Book study group in Helsinki, Finland has been studying The URANTIA Book the past 15 years and the group's activity has included steady work on a Finnish translation of The URANTIA Book in cooperation with URANTIA Foundation. The study group in Colombia was the subject of an article in the Summer, 1979, issue of URANTIA Brotherhood Bulletin.

A French translation of The URANTIA Book was published in 1962 under the aegis of URANTIA Foundation; however, due to a court action by URANTIA Foundation against the translator-publisher for enforcement of the terms of the contract with the translator-publisher, the work became unavailable in the early 1970's. URANTIA Foundation is now laying the groundwork to once again make a French version available. Despite this temporary unavailability of a suitable French translation, French-speaking students have continued to study and grow, form groups, and interest new people in the URANTIA teachings. There are several regular French-speaking study groups in France, Belgium, and Quebec, Canada.

While international growth in the first 25 years has been modest, the destiny of the URANTIA movement lies in the dissemination of the URANTIA teachings to all peoples and to all nations of our spiritually beleaguered planet.
