

RECORDS OF OKLAHOMA SOCIETY

In April, 1956, when B. M. Salyer, Jr. found the URANTIA Book in Chicago, brought it home and read ^{it} immediately, he was minister of The Church of Religious Science, meeting at the Y.W.C.A. in Oklahoma City, each Sunday. His enthusiasm for the book was contagious, and the Church ordered several books from the URANTIA Society in Chicago, W. E. Grisso, Jr. obtaining the first. Soon the various interested parties obtained books and started reading. On September 9, 1956, Vesper Services were held at 6:30 P.M. in the Y.W.C.A. to discuss the URANTIA Papers, and this was the first meeting of the group to study the Book. Paper 86, "Early Evolution of Religion" was discussed, and it was decided at this meeting to start a new church based on the teachings of the Urantia Papers.

The second meeting of the group of URANTIA readers was held September 12, 1956, at the Y.W.C.A. Weekly Sunday meetings were held until Christmas holidays at ~~the Y.W.C.A.~~ then resumed on January 9, 1957. This Sunday morning class was continued until May 12th, with Edward E. Jones as teacher. On January 23, 1957, a Wednesday evening class was started at the home of W. E. Grisso, Jr. A "beginners" class was started by J. B. Lawton on February 14th, at the Y.W.C.A. and continued for four Thursday evenings, then was held in his home on March 14, 1957.

A letter was sent to William S. Sadler, Jr. in Chicago on October 24, 1956, asking how to start a study group and become a Society. It was learned that at least ten people had to complete the book before application could be made for a charter.

January 21, 1957 the Robert Burtons, from the Chicago group, visited and a meeting was held at the Beacon Club. Attending were the Salyers, Bakers, Grissos, Bordners, Butlers, Lawtons, Goldia Young, Wilma McManus, Mabel Wilson, and Mrs. Archer and the Englishes.

William S. Sadler, Jr. met with the group for the first time at the Lakeview Club on March 9, 1957.

Application to be chartered as a Urantia Society of the Urantia Brotherhood, Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A. was mailed on April 17, 1957, with \$50.00 enclosed. The original 12 who had completed the Book, consisted of the following: B. M. Salyer, Jr., W. E. Grisso, Jr., L. Howard Thornberry, Edward Jones, Goldie B. Young, Wilma L. McManus, Helen T. Butler, J. W. English, Fred J. Tosti, J. B. Lawton, Cleve Bordner, and Patsy Alexander.

On Saturday, April 20, 1957, Bill Sadler met with the group the second time at Glen's, then at the Y.W.C.A. on Sunday, April 21st.

The New Age Christian Church, in conjunction with the Urantia Study Groups, had a picnic at Salyer's Barn, August 21, 1957 to celebrate the birthday of Jesus.

Mr. & Mrs. Clyde Bedell visited the regular Wednesday night class on October 8, 1957, at Berkeley Elliott's home. October 30, 1957 Fred and Jim Leverenz visited the Wednesday night class, which meeting place was changed for this occasion to the Tropical Cafeteria, so all might enjoy their company during the dinner hour.

A lot of new thinking, advanced ideas and information on the "meat" of the URANTIA Book has been absorbed by the Oklahoma City groups, from the visits of the various members from the Chicago group, and their visits are extremely enjoyed and looked forward to with anticipation.

The Charter Committee from the Urantia Brotherhood in Chicago arrived in Oklahoma City on November 23, 1957 to install the Founders and Charter Members of the "First URANTIA Society of Oklahoma". The Chicago group included Mr. & Mrs. Robert Burton and Barney Burton, their son, Mr. & Mrs. William M. Hales. Also present were Mr. & Mrs. Fred Leverenz, formerly from Chicago now from Dallas, Texas. After dinner, the following were installed by Ruth Burton, assisted by Mary Lou Hales, both of the Charter Committee, as Founders: B. M. Salyer, Jr., W. E. Grisso, Jr., L. Howard Thornberry, Edward Jones, Goldia B. Young, Wilma L. McManus, Helen T. Butler, Joe W. English, Fred J. Tosti and J. B. Lawton. Charter members included the following: Mary Kathryn Grisso, Faye Brown, Sally Sewell, Berkeley Elliott, Clyde C. Goodman, Ardythe Shields, Charlene Butler, Mable Wilson, Covie English, W. V. Butler, Helen Ganfield and Jennetta Tosti, *Edna E. Lee*

The Founders comprise the individuals who had read the URANTIA Book, and the Charter members were those who had been regularly attending the study group meetings, but had not finished the Papers, that were recommended by the Founders. They could be called Charter members because they were taken in on the same evening that the Founders were installed.

The URANTIA Society of Oklahoma was the first in Oklahoma, and the fourth chartered group of the URANTIA Brotherhood, on URANTIA. It is the only one of the first four that is a spontaneous group, not having sprung as a result of any member of the original Chicago group, and is second largest of the four.

W. E. Grisso, Jr. was elected as our first President at the organization meeting on December 9, 1957. The Society had been established as a separate organization from the New Age Christian Church and when the church was later dissolved the Society continued to function.

As of January 1, 1958 Rector's Book Store, who stocked the URANTIA Book, had sold 135 copies. 110 URANTIA Books had been ordered direct from Chicago by Wilma McManus, and had been sold, making a total of 245 URANTIA books either given away or sold as a result of the efforts of the Oklahoma City group.

Bill Sadler made his fourth appearance with our Wednesday night group on March 5, 1958. Starting on May 3, 1958 he conducted 27 seminars during the next five years.

The first annual meeting was held December 8, 1958 at 5615 N. Linn, with 16 members and 8 visitors. Six new members ~~were~~ were taken in at that meeting. They were John Baccarini, Earl W. Baker, Lea Lawton, Emma Medlin, Hazel R. Nichol and Sally Roberts.

The Society had been meeting in the recreation hall of the New Age Christian Church at 5615 N. Linn since May 27, 1958. Since the church was being dissolved and the building was to be sold, our last meeting there was on January 14, 1959.

After meeting at a variety of places we finally settled on the Federated Women's Building at 707 N. E. 42 starting September 2, 1959. We continued meeting there until December 1966. We had received a donation from the Grisso's for the purpose of accumulating library books. We purchased a two drawer filing cabinet for our records and started a small library.

Leona Duncan was welcomed as a new member on December 14, 1959.

August 21, 1959 was celebrated in the home of Wilma McManus with 18 present. Highlights of the life of Jesus was discussed.

July 23, 1960 we held an open meeting in the Crystal Room at the Skirvin. Each member made a concerted effort to bring guests. 39 attended. Bill Sadler was the speaker for the evening.

August 21 was celebrated in the home of Wilma McManus with 24 in attendance. Goldia Young was in charge of the program which included a resume starting with the Universal Father down to and including our Michael and his seventh bestowal.

Meredith and Irene Sprunger, from Ft. Wayne, Indiana, spent the weekend of September 10 with us. We had an all day meeting in the Executive Suite of the Skirvin Hotel and discussed Papers 110 and 196.

Bill Sadler met with us on October 15. Since his last visit he ^{had} done extensive work on his book "A Study of the Master Universe" and he shared much of the fruits of his work. The intent of this book (or books) is to unlock the deeper concepts of the URANTIA Book so they will be more comprehensible to the average layman.

Lucille Jones and Dr. John L. Duncum were welcomed as new members.

The Wednesday evening group finished going through the URANTIA Book for the first time July 26, 1961 -- taking approximately 4½ years.

The group elected to change their method of study, whereby instead of reading the Paper a moderator would volunteer for a Paper, assign sections which were to be told and discussed by the group.

Jesus birthday was celebrated in the home of Wilma McManus. August 21 and Wilma are becoming synonymous as we have celebrated this occasion in her home each year since we have been a Society. Two new members were taken in: George Ande and Charles L. Kistler.

Clyde Goodman was in charge of the program and gave a resume of history regarding the area of Jesus' birth place, then a story of Michael from the time of his creation to his bestowal on Urantia.

The annual meeting and the anniversary were combined and held on December 11, 1961 in the Executive Suite of the Skirvin.

August 21, 1962 was held in the Downtowner Hotel with 12 members, 4 guests and the following new members: Ruth Montgomery, Frankie Goodman, John Lawton, Wanda Rogers, Geneve Butler, James P. Butler, Albert G. Thomas, Perry Haskell Winn

September 15th Bill Sadler held the 27th seminar. This was Bill's last visit to Oklahoma.

Two new members were inducted at our annual meeting December 10, 1962: George Stump and Bud Kagan.

In 1963, in addition to the Wednesday night class, a Sunday evening class was started at Berkeley Elliott's home and later meeting at various homes on a per month basis. For the past several years this class has met in the home of Berkeley Elliott.

August 21, 1963 was celebrated at the Downtowner Motel. Program was on the life of Jesus -- Mortal Career, Son of Man, Son of God, Post-Mortal Career.

Six new members were welcomed: Juanita Cheney, Shirley Parris, Waldine Stump, Roddy Brown, Bill Brown and Veldon Morrow. On November 20 Mary L. Lawton was welcomed as a new member.

November 23 of this year we were saddened by the untimely death of Bill Sadler.

1964 was the occasion of the First Triennial Delegate Assembly in Chicago.

The Oklahoma Society was represented by Helen Butler and Berkeley Elliott.

At this meeting four councilors of the URANTIA Brotherhood were elected:

Berkeley Elliott, Clyde C. Goodman, Wilma McManus and Helen Butler.

In January 1965 Florine Sadler (Mrs. Wm. S. Sadler, Jr.) visited our group and a social was held in her honor on January 30 in the home of Berkeley Elliott.

A special meeting was held on October 29 for the purpose of taking in two new members -- Ervin and Juanita Shull. Jim and Eunice Mills of Neenah, Wisconsin were guests

August 21 was held at the Downtowner with 30 members and guests present. George Ande opened the program with a reading of "Acme of Religious Living", Helen Butler told of Jesus' morontia appearances and the program was concluded by Berkeley Elliott telling a little story by Bill Sadler on the "Meaning of Christmas" with regard to Jesus' birthday.

Our anniversary was celebrated at Berkeley's with three of our local "stars", Faye Brown, Marjorie Sawyer and Berkeley presenting a parody on Adam and Eve. Jonnie Bates entertained us between acts with the hula.

We had 29 guests during the year, 16 from out of town.

January 15, 1966 the first URANTIA funeral service in Oklahoma was conducted for our first President, W. E. "Bill Grisso, Jr. This service was performed by Clyde C. Goodman.

Jesus birthday was celebrated at the 89er Inn with 29 members and guests attending. Two new members: Babe Tolentino and Marjorie Sawyer were welcomed into the Society.

The anniversary party was held November 26. Entertainment for the evening was an original play on Andon and Fonta written by Berkeley Elliott and performed by Berkeley and Helen Butler. We had 27 guests for the year, sixteen from out of town.

During the year we had book marks made, with URANTIA quotations on them. A supply of these were placed by the register at Rector's Book Store in an effort to pique the interest of their customer's.

This year we moved our meeting place to Van's, Inc. at 9412 N. Robinson where we met for a four years.

Thanks to the efforts of George Ande, there were three newspaper articles on Jacques' visit and a television interview on a local daytime show. Many calls from this show and our unofficial record shows a great deal more books were being sold at Rector's.

~~Jan~~ Jesus' birthday was celebrated at the 89er Inn with 24 members and 29 guests. Mr. Weiss was the guest speaker. We welcomed six new members: Esta Alford, Walter Cheatham, Nan Cheatham, D. L. Cook, Laliah Cook, and Linda Cook.

Our Society was now 10 years old and our anniversary party was held at Berkeley's home. After a delicious dinner we were entertained by the Elliott traveling minstrels. Berk and Faye performed an original play by Miss Elliott about Melchizedek and Abraham. Between acts "Gram" sang and played the guitar. Margaret and Roy Sperry and Dianna were guests.

Six URANTIA Books were placed in libraries during the year: 2 at Oklahoma University at Norman, 2 at Central State University at Edmond and 2 in the Oklahoma City Public Library.

Jesus birthday was celebrated at the Holiday Inn South, Aug. 21, 1968. Four new members were taken into the Society: E. E. Finefrock, Sr. and Thelma Finefrock, E. E. Finefrock, Jr. and Joyce Finefrock. The program was on the Vocations and Avocations of Jesus the Man.

The eleventh anniversary was celebrated on Nov. 30, 1968 at Berkeley's with 17 members and 15 guests. Margaret and Roy Sperry gave an interesting report on their recent trip to Hawaii and showed photographs of scenes visited and URANTIA students they met and visited with while on the Islands.

Our first Forum was held Jan. 25, 1969 at the Holiday Inn South with 43 in attendance. This was a "first" for the Society and was held in an attempt to bring together known Book owners in our area. Clyde C. Goodman conducted the meeting starting in the afternoon by discussing the five Epochal Revelations, and the evening session was on the mortal's ascent from this planet to the Local Universe headquarters. Charts had been prepared by John Lawton, which Clyde used, and a question and answer session was conducted after both talks. Ten copies of "A Study of the Master Universe" was purchased for our library. A special Easter program with 43 attending was held on March 30.

The Society purchased property at 45th & N. Shartel with the intention of building a meeting place in the future.

Our second Forum was held June 28 with 28 in attendance. Clyde Goodman conducted the afternoon session, talking about the origin and destiny of the soul. In the evening John Lawton (with an assist from Albert Thomas) showed charts and narrated on cosmology.

August 21st was celebrated at Holiday Inn, South with Vern Grimsley as the principal speaker. One new member, was received, Jean Ann Francis, ~~was~~ into the Society.

We ran an ad in the classified section of the newspaper asking for first printings. One copy was purchased.

This was a most progressive and rewarding year for the First URANTIA Society of Oklahoma. We sent the old year out and brought in 1970 with a party at the Cook's.
