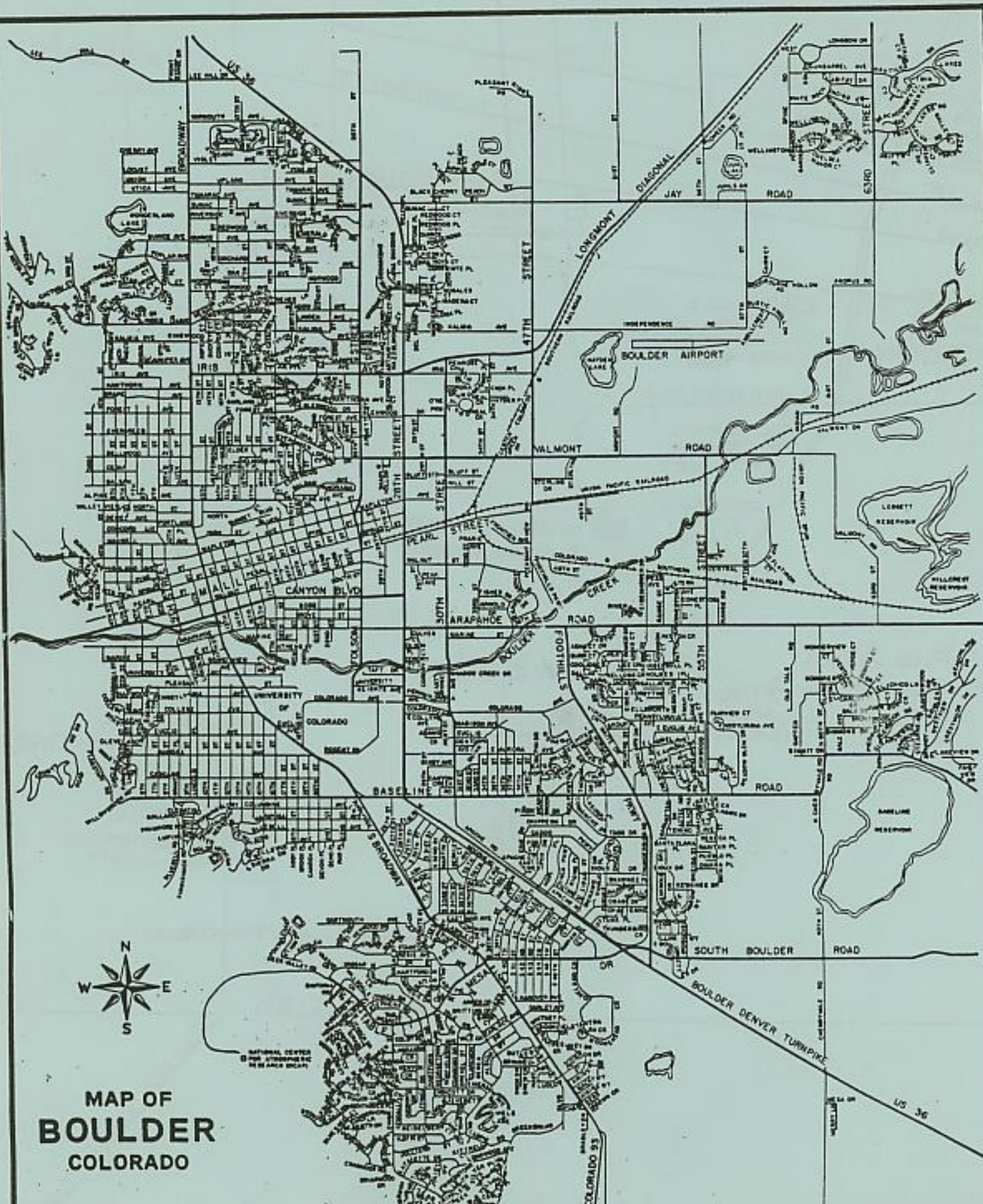

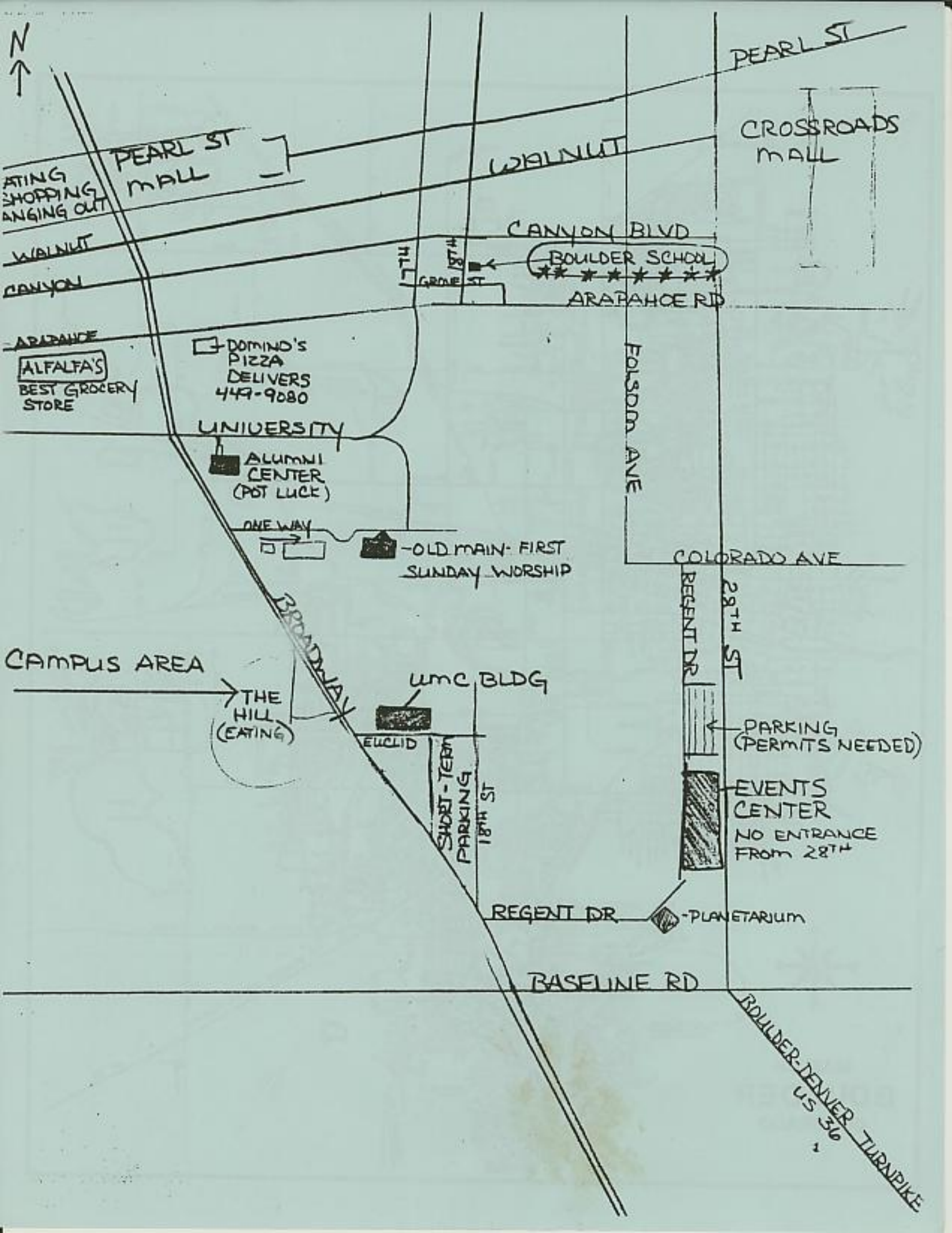

Entertainment

Boulder is never boring. There is constantly something going on, so you can always find something to do. If you're a music fan, there are often big name concerts in the area, not to mention all the music to be heard in local restaurants and pubs just about every night during the summer. For shopping, there is the unique Pearl Street Mall that offers all sorts of shops and many different types of street entertainment to delight the imagination. The mall is also filled with various types of restaurants. Don't miss at least going inside the Historic Hotel Boulderado with its stained glass ceiling and Victorian furnishings on 13th and Spruce. There are three fine restaurants in the hotel - Winston's for seafood, Franco's for pasta bar and other Italian specialties, and the Steak Porch for steak dinners. The mezzanine is always a nice place to hear light jazz and folk music. This is also located in the hotel.

The Harvest Restaurant is a big favorite in Boulder, offering a large menu of healthy food including meat dishes, as well as an open plant-filled atmosphere. It is located on Pearl Street just east of the mall.

Alfalfa's market on Broadway and Arapahoe may be the largest health food store you'll ever enjoy stepping into. It is complete with Deli, Bakery, bulk foods and herbs, meat and fish departments. It's a great place to grab an interesting lunch to go.

Across Broadway from the university is the area known as the Hill. The Hill has a good bakery and bookshop called Brillig Works, a drugstore, snack shops, two delis, clothing stores and two movie theaters. A lot of the other theaters are located on Arapahoe, northeast of the university.

There are also two Drive-ins northeast of Boulder. Near the Drive-in is a family fun center that offers miniature golf, go-carts and batting cages. There are numerous health spas, recreation and aerobic centers, as Boulder is a center for health and fitness.

Of course, one of the best things Boulder has to offer is the mountains. Chatauqua Park, at the foot of Boulder's Flatirons, is an easy access spot for many hiking and jogging trails. There are also extensive bicycle paths in and around Boulder. You may rent bicycles at University Bicycles on Pearl Street or Mountain Bikes on College Street.

I hope this will give you an idea of what Boulder has to offer and help you fill your free time while you're here for the Intensive.
