Spiritual search results in new book

Six months ago, Merritt Horn of Lafayette decided to take time away from work to concentrate on prayer and worship.

Although he had been on a spiritual search since he was 15, Horn, 31, decided that his quest had reached the point "where there was lots of understanding, but I was not seeing clearly."

The results of six months in prayer are detailed in a book he wrote, "The Call of the Spirit."

He describes "The Call" as "the relationship of living with God, rather than theological gymnastics."

Horn quit his job to further his religious quest — "and to help my wife."

Jeanne Horn, was expecting the couple's fourth daughter (Carmen, now six weeks old) and agreed that two parents at home could provide better family life for Shamah, 4, and 18month-old twins Alexandra and Ariana.

Although strongly religious, Horn no longer attends church.

"A church is good in that it promotes a relationship with God," Horn said. "But so often churches get sidetracked into worthy things other than the relationship with God."

In July and August Horn concentrated on home-centered worship and prayers.

Nightly, after childcare chores and prayers, he would write those thoughts in a journal.

"The Call of the Spirit" is a crystalized free verse compilation of those journals.

The relationship is broken into four parts: the call, the journey, the messenger and the mission.

In the "call" section, Horn explains the love God has for humans, and the question of why people do not heed His word.

"A million stars
would I trade for your love,
A thousand galaxies
for your devotion.
But these are beyond my grasp
without your assent.
I, who, have made heaven and

earth, will not take what must be

Others may compel you by force;

I will guide you only by consent. The decision must be yours."

The "journey" section explains the kindling of faith and God's trust. It depicts God as a loving father.

"Shall I deny my spirit to my children? Shall I be deaf to their pleas? Shall I disregard their needs? No, for I am a loving parent, and I shall do all in my power to help them. But my spirit is thwarted by their lack of faith."

The final chapter, the "mission," is spreading the message beyond one's self that God is alive and with each person now:

"Tell them they must no longer live

as if I were not here. They know I am infinite, yet they imagine that I am not with them.

They know of my power, yet they think I cannot help them.

They know of my love, yet they refuse to let me comfort them.
