

Now, you can all do something, I am sure, and I know you want to do your best to help us take care of the sick and suffering in this great city.

I know the young people will not disappoint me, so I turn to them for help, believing that they will each do their part.

Dear Brother White:

Just a line to congratulate you on that six-  
pound <sup>for</sup> of Oct. 5. You are gradually building up quite a family.  
By December first if all goes well we hope to be rich and increased  
in goods somewhat in our neighborhood.

I was glad to get inclosures you sent me from the brethren in  
Australia and elsewhere. Our Sunday evening meetings on the South  
side are increasing more and more in interest. I enjoy them very  
much. My work on the whole is going along about on the same even  
trend. There seems some prospect that within the next year I shall  
probably be appointed to take charge of the new chair of hydrotherapy  
in the Post Graduate Medical School of Chicago. This will give me  
an opportunity to reach about a half of all the physicians who come  
to this city to take post-graduate work. It seems almost too much  
to expect that such an opportunity should fall to us but the indi-  
cations look favorable at the present time, and of course I shall  
do my duty to follow it up. We begin a regular course in hydro-  
therapy for the medical students of the different schools the  
first of November.

Today at one o'clock I begin the regular course of hygiene  
in the Dunkards' school of Chicago. This is a general Bible  
training school something I think very similar to the foreign  
mission seminary you people are establishing in Washington. They  
give a two-year course in Chicago. I am to give them fifty

hours a year in health and religious. The school is attended by the best of their young ministers and will afford a wonderful opportunity to inoculate the whole Dunkard people as these workers scatter in the summer all over the country.

The Doctors Nicola relieved us of what work we were doing at Hinesdale and Dr. Comstock took my work at the Dispensary, so with the exception of my teaching in the medical school I have step by step and through a very peculiar train of circumstances become simply a doctor in private practice. But after all I am not practicing so very much. I go to the office pretty regularly and try and take care of our little practice which has caused us such an effort to build up, but I am devoting my energies to following up various openings which are presenting themselves for educational work and for presenting our health principles to the people. Our work for next summer is mostly contracted for now.

I am working very hard on my various lectures on health and Bible subjects which I am preparing for chautauques next summer and for the lyceum courses a year from this winter.

I shall appreciate very much your suggestions on the manuscript on health and healing, especially in view of the fact that I have decided to go over the book thoroughly before sending it to the press. It has been so long since I completed this manuscript that I have gotten hold of some good touches in my efforts to work up my chautauque lectures. that I would like to put in here and there in this manuscript.
