

HUSBANDS MORE PRECIOUS THAN MANY RUBIES!

Intelligent Speaker Points Out Just What Gems We Men Really Are.

That is the advice given sixty-five members of the United States Training camp for women who attended a luncheon yesterday afternoon in the Stevens building. The adviser was Dr. John Dill Robertson.

"If you haven't already a good husband get rid of him and get a regular one. You might think you know of happiness, but you'll be surprised."

"Of course you're going to have a hard time finding one. There are only three good husbands in the world, and my husband is all of 'em. But keep looking—get one—keep him—then you'll find some happiness."

Her husband is Dr. W. S. Sadler. Robertson and Smolke Agalin.

Of course the entire luncheon was devoted to the husband question. Dr. John Dill Robertson, public health commissioner, was there. It is necessary to say that the doctor talked of smoke, its dangers and disadvantages.

Dr. Robertson talked for thirty-five minutes and won sixty-five women to his anti-smoke crusade. He explained that no chimney has a legal right to put forth black smoke for more than a month on a stretch. He explained that disease is caused by smoke. He pointed out the harm smoke wrought on a beauty.

The Girls All Agree.

The sixty-five members of the training camp got up and gave nine open "Rubs" for the doctor. They pledged themselves to the cause, and were appointed a committee of one to fight the evil. Dr. Robertson departed well satisfied.

Dr. Julia Holmes Smith, Chicago's oldest woman doctor, asserted that "it is a beautiful life" and that she was glad to be a member of the organization.

The members voted that the outdoor life is the only life, and made plans for a camp next year. It will be remembered that they camped on the eastern shore of Lake Michigan for six weeks last August. And they all agreed with Dr. Lena Sadler about the "good husband" question. Watch your step, you men.

STAGE FOLK WHO AIDED WAR CAUSE NOW SEEK HELP

For the first time in four years, Chicago is to have a "drive" without a quota. The Actors' Memorial day campaign, to be held Dec. 5, has set no definite amount to be asked for the fund which cares for aged, infirm, and destitute members of the theatrical profession.

Each of the twelve "legitimate" theaters and the two higher priced vaudeville houses will hold special matinees Dec. 5, tickets to which will be allotted to subscribers to the fund. Each theater is in charge of a special committee of society women, business men, and stage folk. Mrs. Kellogg Fairbank being chairman of the sales organization and Mrs. Edward T. Swift vice chairman.

Tomorrow all actresses in the city will start to obtain contributions, and will continue until the memorial day celebration.

"This is Chicago's only opportunity to repay the theatrical world for its services during the war drives," said Mrs. Fairbank. "The theatrical managers and the players never refused a request. Theaters were taxed and disrupted, but they never hesitated to permit speakers and collectors to interrupt performances to solicit patrons. The actors must be aided in their worthy charities."

The business committee in charge of the general drive is headed by Charles W. Folds and is composed of Samuel Insull, J. Ogden Armour, George M. Reynolds, Cyrus McCormick, R. T. Crane Jr., Gen. Leonard Wood, Senator Adell McCormick, and Mayor Thompson.

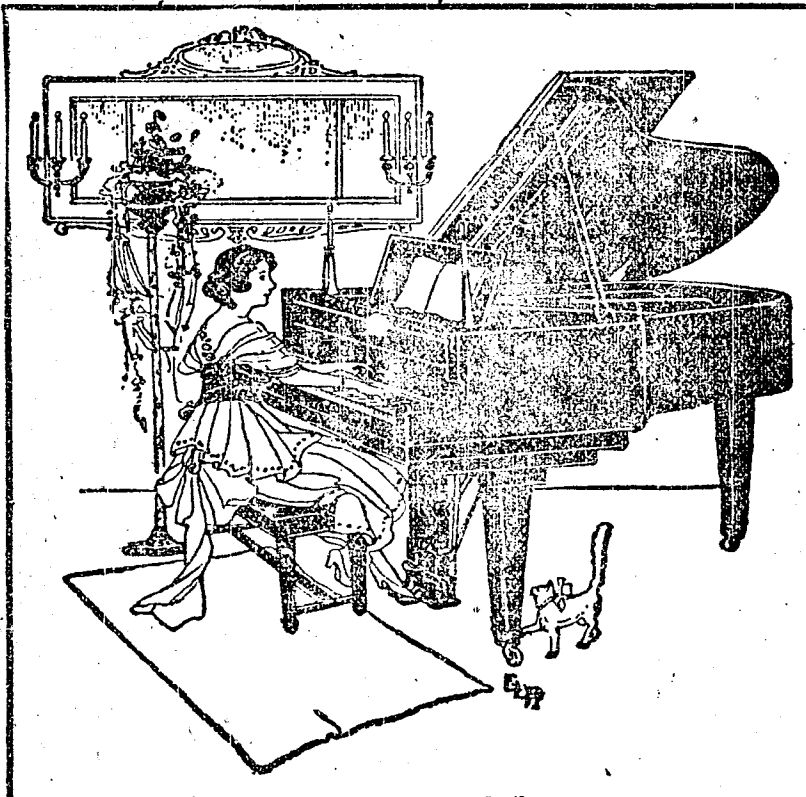
DEO YOUR PARDON!

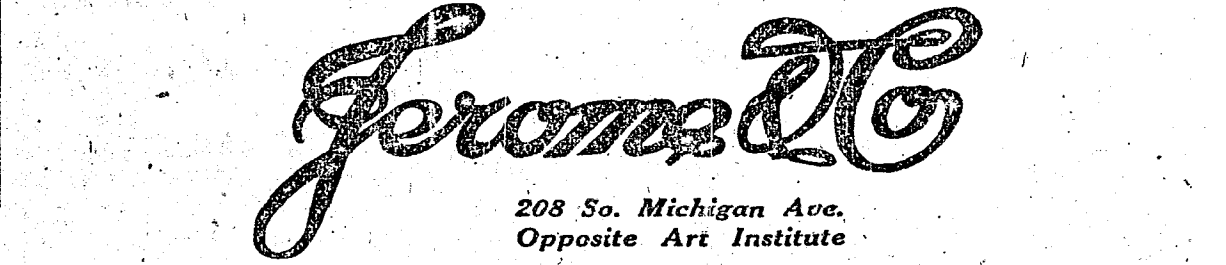
