

**SCIENTIST SAYS  
 EINSTEIN STOLE  
 OTHERS' THEORY**

 Vallejo, Cal., April 12.—[By the Associated Press.]—A statement saying that he "vigorously contested" the announcement made last night by Dr. W. W. Campbell, director of Lick observatory, that development of photographs taken during the last total eclipse of the sun confirmed the Einstein theory of relativity, was made public here today by Capt. T. J. See, government astronomer at Maro Island navy yard.  
 After reciting the Campbell statement, Prof. See said:  
 "The celebrated English physicist Henry Cavendish (1731-1810) calculated the effect of Newton's theory that the corpuscles of light are bent toward the sun in passing near it, and in 1801 Dr. J. Von Soldner, a German physicist of eminence in his day, actually derived the formula recently used by Einstein. This was 122 years ago."  
 "It has been shown by Prof. Dr. E. Gehrke, director of the Imperial Physical and Technical Institute of Berlin, and by Prof. P. Leonard of Heidelberg, winner of the Nobel prize in physics, that Soldner omitted a certain factor in his formula of 1801, which error Einstein also copied when he appropriated the Einstein-Soldner formula in the Einstein paper of 1911."  
 "In a subsequent paper to the Berlin Academy of Sciences, 1915, Einstein camouflaged this fraud, as best he could, yet could not prevent its discovery and exposure by Prof. Leonard of Heidelberg, Gehrke of Berlin, and Westin of Stockholm. Prof. Westin charged Einstein with downright plagiarism."  
 "In considering the Newton-Von Soldner refraction of star-light from the eclipses in Australia the value of the refraction of the star-light responds to the credit of Newton-Soldner, not of Einstein."  
 "It only remains to be pointed out that the Einstein theory of relativity is not confirmed and cannot be confirmed."

**LAW TO CONTROL  
 MIDWIVES URGED;  
 BLINDNESS CITED**

Determined to put a stop to alleged dishonest methods of practice on the part of the 3,000 or more midwives operating in Chicago, a committee was named at a luncheon yesterday at the Chicago Woman's club to confer with State Senator John J. Boehm with a view of having enacted an amendment to the proposed new state medical practice act.  
 Attending the luncheon was a joint committee from the club and from the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness. Dr. Lena Sadler was chairman.

Action followed the presentation by Miss Marion A. Campbell, secretary of the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness, of the result of an investigation recently made by her to learn the true situation as to midwifery in Chicago.  
 Should the measure become law it will require all midwives to have at least one year of high-school training from six months to a year of special training in their profession; registration at the city health department, and submission to inspection of their work at any time by a health department representative.  
 Dr. Frank Cary is chairman of the legislation committee, which includes Dr. Joseph B. De Lee, Dr. Sadler, Dr. Effie Davis, Miss Campbell, and Max Murdock.

**RULING CANADIAN  
 PARTY DEMANDS  
 MINISTER TO U. S.**

Ottawa, Ont., April 12.—[Special.]—Strong demands that the Dominion government carry out its plan and appoint a Canadian minister at Washington were made today at a caucus of the Liberal government senators and members. The need of such action is held to be emphasized by a review of events.  
 The difficulty with the British embassy at Washington, over the execution of the fisheries treaty is one instance cited, and that trouble is not over yet.  
 Government circles here have an abounding suspicion that in the amendments made to that pact by the American senate the influence of Sir Auckland Goddes was reflected after he had been passed over as a signatory. The matter was wound up in a most unsatisfactory way.  
 Another cause of difficulty which it

is thought might have been avoided with proper representation at Washington is the restriction placed upon the sale of vessels to Canadians by the United States shipping board. The two companies are at loggerheads over this matter.  
 The latest occurrence is the ruling at Washington that fish caught by Americans and stored in Canada is subject to duty when sent to the United States. Canadian, Pacific coast storage firms are injuriously affected and ask that representation be made to Washington for them and a minister appointed.  
 The position of the government is that it is prepared to send a minister plenipotentiary to Washington as soon as a man suitably qualified by status and wealth can be found. So far the search has been rather abortive.

**TWO GIRLS, MAN, NABBED IN RAID.**  
 The police raided a house at 6234 Cornelia avenue yesterday and arrested Lillian Clark and Germa Johnson, 828 South Marshfield avenue, and Charles Klapp. The girls were charged with being inmates of a disorderly house and Klapp was booked as keeper.

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
