Seeds of the morning glory Heavenly Blue should be started early. They will germinate more quickly if soaked in water for 24 hours before sowing. The moonflower may also be started. These seeds have a hard coat which should be filed and soaked in water. Keep the seed box in a warm place Obtain a supply of labels now. For pot use the five inch size is excellent. To preserve them dip the labels in

Tuesday, April 11. Watch the seedlings that are grow ing in seed boxes in the window. If they are weak and spindly they are growing in a too warm and dry place. The hotbed should be properly aired and watered. Give protection by coverbright days. Many plants in the rock

garden will show signs of heaving, these should be pressed firmly into the Wednesday, April 12. Continue with the pruning of trees nd shrubs. Young trees should be given every attention to see that they are properly trained and have good scaffold branches. Remember that !f these young trees are properly cared for in their youth the removal of

large branches will be unnecessar, when they become old. Sow the seeds of primroses and cyclamen for bloomng next winter. Thursday, April 13. Repot house plants. Palms, bra-aenas, pardanus, rubber plants, and many others will do best if they are not overpotted. Palms that have shoved themselves upward in their containers may be entirely removed from these containers, the lower part

of the root system cut away, and reotted. Friday, April 14.

When growth is starting, ferns can e divided best. The adiantums or maiden hair ferns are easily increased in this way. They should be turned out of their pots and a knife passed right through the ball from top to hottom, dividing it into two or more portions, which may then be potted separately.

Saturday, April 15. The rock garden will have to be oked over soon and additions both stone and plants made where needed. Certain plants will have to be restricted, others propagated, and a good top dressing put on.
