High Ranking Officers Review Final Parade.

(Picture on back page.) Thirty hundred young men brought the annual Citizens' Military Training camp period to a close at Fort Sheridan yesterday as they passed in review on the parade ground before high ranking army officers and 2,500 spectators.

A highlight of the day was the award of twenty-nine medals and nine scholarships to the outstanding trainees selected by a camp board after examining their records for the thirty day period.

Lieut. Col. Jesse A. Ladd, acting commandant, was the chief of the day's ceremonies, while the review was under direction of Lieut. Col. Joseph B. Johnson, chief of the summer encampment.

Wins Pershing Gold Medal. The prize most coveted by the trainees, the Gen. John J. Pershing gold medal and a trip to Washington, D. C. was won by David S. Barkley, 928 Villa street, Racine, Wis.

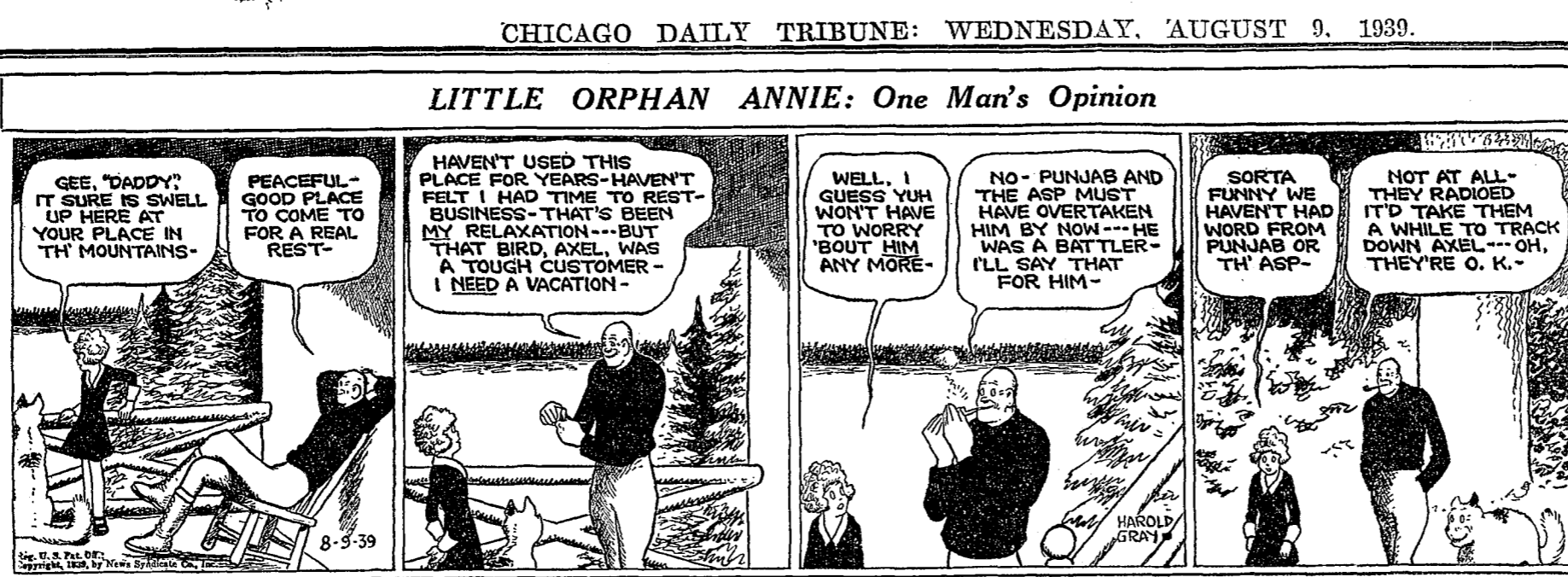

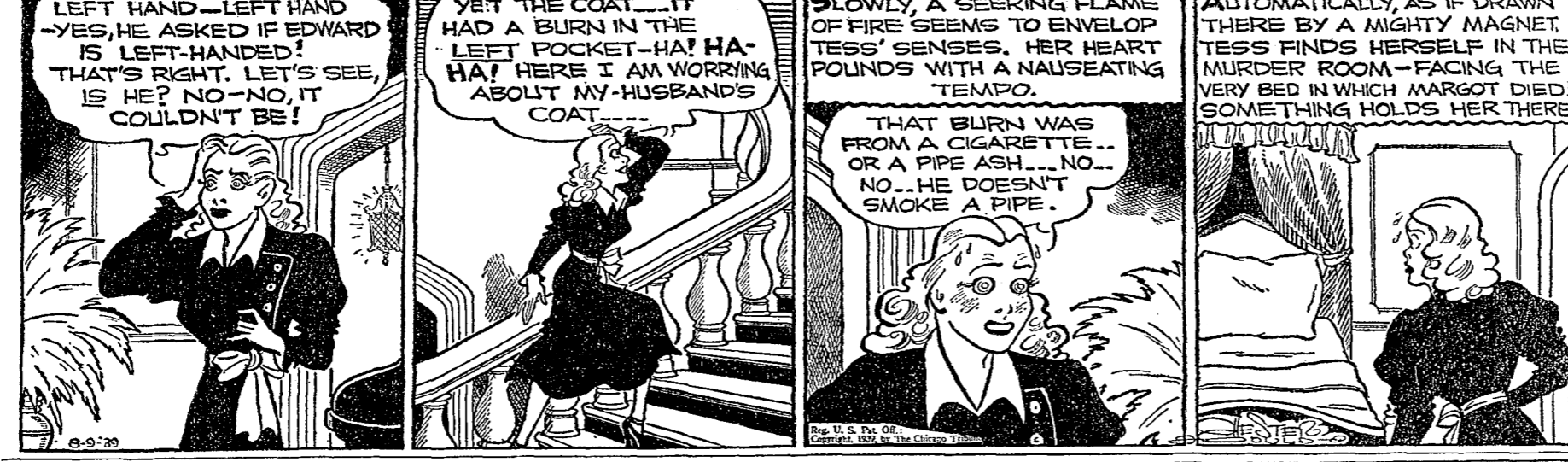

Hugh Edward McGowan. Hugh Edward McGowan, a retired city fireman, died yesterday in the home of his son, Edward, at 10348 Eberhart avenue. He was 68 years old. Another son, Hugh Jr., a daughter, Mrs. Leah Bugg, and his widow, Nellie, survive. Services will be held tomorrow morning in Holy Rosary church, with burial in Holy Sepulchre cemetery. Mr. McGowan entered the fire department service in 1891 and was the last living member of Engine Company 63, which was almost wiped out in the cold storage fire at the Columbian Exposition in 1893.

Mrs. Ida Hagstrom. Mrs. Ida Hagstrom, 84 years old, 5223 North Sawyer avenue, died yesterday in the Swedish Covenant hospital. She suffered fractures of her right hip and arm July 26 in a fall while visiting in the home of her son-in-law, the Rev. Frederic E. Pump, 1708 Oak avenue, Evanston. He is pastor of the Covenant Methodist church of Evanston. Mrs. Hagstrom's husband, John, a minister, died last May at the age of 86. She is survived by Mrs. Pump and two other daughters, Mrs. Paul Jacobson, with whom she lived, and Mrs. Carl Olson of Minneapolis, Minn.

Rupert Mitford. LONDON, Aug. 8.—Rupert Mitford, fifth son of Lord Redesdale, whose political views contrasted sharply with those of his pro-Nazi sisters, Unity and Diana, died suddenly today in London at the age of 44. His sister, Diana, the wife of Sir Oswald Mosley, British fascist leader, recently making a name for himself as a movie actor, Mitford had a small part in "Goodbye Mr. Chips." According to intimate friends, his health was affected by a kind of influenza epidemic. He frequently visited America.

Dr. Emil G. Vrtiak. Dr. Emil G. Vrtiak, 5878 Forest Glen avenue, a research specialist in rheumatic and arthritic ailments and associate professor of clinical medicine at Rush Medical college, died Monday in a Presbyterian hospital where he had been ill three weeks following a heart attack. Dr. Vrtiak was born in Czechoslovakia in 1890 and was graduated from Rush in 1919. He leaves his widow, Louise, and two small sons. Services will be held in his home at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow.

Edward A. Biggs Sr. Funeral services for Edward A. Biggs Sr., an attorney, will be held at 1 p. m. today at 5501 North Ashland avenue. Mr. Biggs died Sunday after two years' illness. He was 70 years old and lived at 6111 Eddy street. President Tappan Gregory of the Chicago Bar association yesterday appointed a committee of twelve members to represent the bar at the funeral. Mr. Biggs' widow, Gertrude; a son, Edward Jr., and a daughter, Marion, survive.

Theodore J. Schlorff. The funeral of Theodore J. Schlorff, for thirty years chief accountant for the De Laval Separator company, will be held at 2 p. m. tomorrow in St. John's Evangelical Lutheran church, Wilmette. Burial will be in Concordia cemetery. Mr. Schlorff died Monday night in his home at 1245 Elmwood avenue, Evanston. He was a past president of the Chicago Lutheran Athletic association. Surviving are his widow, Glenn, two sisters, and a brother.

Zog and Geraldine Occupy Windsor's Former Chateau VERSAILLES, France, Aug. 8 (AP).—King Zog and Queen Geraldine of Albania, dethroned since Italy's April 8 conquest of their country, arrived here today to take up residence in chateau de la Maye, formerly occupied by the duke and duchess of Windsor. The duke was the former King Edward VIII of England. Queen Geraldine is the former Princess of Greece. Zog's three sisters were in the entourage which reached France after circuitous travel through Europe.

DR. LENA SADLER DIES; PRACTICED IN CITY 30 YEARS. Dr. Lena K. Sadler, a physician in Chicago for more than thirty years, died yesterday in her home at 533 Diversey parkway. She was associate director of the Chicago Institute of Research and Diagnostic and an associate editor of the Journal of Higher Education. He was a past director of the American University union in Paris. His daughter, Mary, survives. Services will be held at 3 p. m. tomorrow in Bond chapel at the university. They will be conducted by the Rev. Norris L. Tibbets, pastor of the Hyde Park Baptist church.

Robert J. Timmis. Gainesville, Tex., Aug. 8 (AP).—Robert J. Timmis, 75 years old, a cotton merchant who was one of the heroes of the Lusitania disaster, died yesterday in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Sherwin Murphy, widow of Richard J. Murphy, press secretary of the World's Columbian Exposition, and the daughter of Joseph Sherwin, pioneer Chicago packer, died yesterday in her home at 4821 Dorchester avenue. She was 76 years old. Mrs. Murphy was formerly active in the Arche club and was a founder of the Ambrose Women's club. A son, Sherwin, survives. Services will be held at 10 a. m. Friday in St. Ambrose church, Ellis avenue and 47th street. Burial will be in Calvary cemetery.

FORD TAKES OATH AS LIEUTENANT GENERAL IN ARMY. Maj. Gen. Stanley H. Ford, commander of the 6th corps area, was sworn in yesterday by Lieut. Col. William M. Connor, advocate general of the state, as lieutenant general. After the ceremony, which was held in the new post office building, Gen. Ford left for Camp Grant to review National Guard troops in annual training maneuvers. Three other major generals, including Gen. Roy D. Keohn and his staff, declined to attend the ceremony. They will start at 7 a. m. instead of the previously set hour of 5 o'clock. If rain comes, the war games will be postponed until Thursday morning.

Nurse Falls Four Floors, Walks Back Into Hospital. A New York, Aug. 8 (Special).—After a four-story fall from a hospital room Miss Edna Mills, 29 years old, a nurse, today declined aid and was taken back into the hospital. She suffered only a sprained ankle, her fall being broken by a tree near the window.

MRS. STACK, 75, EX-WIFE OF LATE SPORTSMAN, DIES. Mrs. Della Ross Stack died yesterday at the age of 75 in her home at the Deerpath Inn in Lake Forest. She was the first wife of the late James Langford Stack, millionaire Chicago advertising man and polo star, who was famous as a sportsman in the early years of this century. When they were divorced in 1909 she received a \$100,000 cash money settlement, the largest settlement in the history of the Chicago divorce courts at that time. Mr. Stack died in 1928. Services for Mrs. Stack will be held at 2:30 p. m. today in the Church of the Holy Spirit in Lake Forest.

Dr. Cooper Curtice. Washington, D. C., Aug. 8 (Special).—Dr. Cooper Curtice, a pioneer in development of successful methods for eradication of cattle ticks and type of poultry disease, died today at his home at Beltsville, Md. He was 83 years old and still active in private research work. He retired from the bureau of animal husbandry in the department of agriculture in 1930.

Mrs. Emily G. Clausen. Funeral services for Mrs. Emily G. Clausen, widow of Chicago for 61 years, will be held at 2 p. m. today in her home at 2443 Bernard street. Mrs. Clausen died in her home Saturday at the age of 75. She came to Chicago from Norway when a girl of 15. She was the widow of Elias Clausen, who was in the tailoring business here for many years. Surviving are a daughter and two sons.

President of Cuba Appoints New Agricultural Secretary. HAVANA, Aug. 8.—President Federico Laredo Bru today appointed Amadeo Lopez Castro secretary of agriculture, to replace José García Montes, who resigned. Montes, who is on leave from the post of director of agriculture, will return to that position.

RAIN HOLDS UP WAR EXERCISES AT CAMP GRANT. Predictions that today's heavy rain would continue tomorrow caused officers of the Illinois National Guard to consider postponing the combat exercises on which 6,500 guardsmen are ready to set out in the morning. At a conference tonight Maj. Gen. Roy D. Keohn and his staff decided that if no more rain falls before dawn the maneuvers will start at 7 a. m. instead of the previously set hour of 5 o'clock. If rain comes, the war games will be postponed until Thursday morning.

Elgin School Board Cuts Month from Next Term. Elgin's board of education yesterday announced an emergency retrenchment program that will shorten the next school year one month, will close one elementary building, and discontinue all kindergarten classes. The board lopped \$98,000 off its budget to keep expenditures within income, but still faces a deficit of \$200,000, which was said to be largely the accumulation of previous years. President C. R. Dougherty said the district will seek a tax rate increase this fall.
