#### CLAIM 'PROFIT' ON OPERATIONS OF WORLD FAIR

New York, Aug. 8 [Special] .- Following a meeting of the executive and finance committee of the New York World's Fair corporation, it was stated today that the fair made an operating profit of between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 for the first half of its 1939 operating season. The operating profit was defined as the excess of income over outgo for the period from the opening of the fair on April 30 to July 30. It does not take into account the capital debt from the construction period, which includes several million dollars in unpaid bills of contractors and subcontractors Fair officials have denied that these bills total as much as \$12,000,000, as asserted at a recent contractors' meeting, but have not made public

their own figure. The fair management made public revised attendance figures today showing an average of 127.697 paid admissions daily during the first 100 days. This was about 100,000 a day under the estimate of attendance or which the fair was built and financed.




