Following an outdoor speech here on KGBS, 10 A.M. Sunday in Peralta Plaza at UCLA this international radio broadcaster Vern Bennom Grimsley observed that there is an intense reevaluation of religion in process on American campuses.

general U.S. public claim belief in the existence of God, the figure is closer to 60 per cent among college and university students.

"But campus anti-religious feelings are directed more against large ecclesiastical institutions than against personal spiritual experience." Grimsely says.

One student at UCLA argued that religion is only a crutch. "People who are spiritually lame and limping may need a crutch," Grimsley countered, "But as they grow in strength. they can begin using it as a walking staff and doing polevaulting with it

"Faith in God is more than a prop, it's a power "

Another student asked what hes ahead for religion.

"The religion of 2001," Grimsley predicted, "will center more on the concept of all mankind as one family the fatherhood of God and the transformed men and women brotherbood of man."

When one UCLA student commented that he didn't believe that man is a child of God. Grimsley replied, "Then it's interesting that I have a higher concept of you than you have of yourself, because I believe you ARE a child of

Grimsley is a. Phi Beta Kappa with a university degree in philosophy and is a former psychological researcher for National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C. His daily radio broadcasts

Grimsley distinguishes between the many religions. "about" Jesus and the authentic religion "of" Jesus; the simple love of God and man

"This love can change the world," be said, "because only can create a transformed planet." he says.
