STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

In this year of our Lord, 1974, the Hawaiian Missionary Society, Inc. was chartered as a Christian, non-profit religious organization.

The name, in title, of this movement is a re-establishment of the name of the original society established here in Honolulu by a group of the most prominent missionaries in the islands in the 1800's.

The original charter of "The Hawaiian Missionary Society", signed by King Kamehameha V (when the islands were a kingdom) is in volume number one of the kingdom's charters in the archives of the state of Hawaii.

Our society selected this name as our corporation title to give us a further challenge than perhaps could otherwise be stimulated.

The original name was abandoned in ¹⁸⁶³~~1852~~ for reasons known only to that organization.

The purposes for our existence as a Christian organization are the religious and charitable works of God, ministering to the poor of spirit and/or monetary endowments; and giving loving assistance through prayer and/or monetary or tangible gifts to the needy.

The works we will do will be perpetuated by gifts, grants and endowments to the society by members of the society and/or non-members alike.

Ours is a young organization with an historic title; a "kamaaiina spirit" toward Hawaii and a great "aloha spirit" for it's people.

The society seeks members from among all or any of the races and from both genders, who are, or will become Christians.

We also seek missionaries who will donate of their time, talents and endowments in the mission of Hawaii and throughout the world.

The society's inspiration comes from our beloved Henry Obookiah, the Hawaiian lad who died in Cornwall, Connecticut in 1818 at the age of 26 before life allowed him to return to his native land as a Christian missionary. It was his life among the pious New Englanders, and his untimely death which inspired the first missionaries to bring the gospel to Hawaii in the early 1800's.
