EDITORIAL---

A cartoon appeared in the Summer, 1976 issue of the Agondonter depicting three concentric circles passing through the bars of a prison cell window, used to illustrate a letter from a prisoner who is a reader of The URANTIA Book. Subsequently, a representative of URANTIA Foundation gently informed us that our cartoon was an improper use of the three concentric circle symbol, which is a registered mark of URANTIA Foundation.

The three concentric circle symbol must be reserved to identify official publications, activities and properties of URANTIA Foundation and its licensees.

The reason the Foundation is so alert to prevent the use of the symbol on cars, buildings, homes, vans, store-fronts, published materials, and manufactured items is that the public might mistake such vehicles, places, and material as officially representing URANTIA Foundation. This could create confusion.

<u>Lesson</u>. We would therefore remind our readers not to use the concentric circle symbol unless you first obtain written permission (license) from URANTIA Foundation, and that, if you are granted permission to use the symbol, that you use it properly: that is, without modification, and for identification purposes only.

I could not help but feel how the beauty and personal love we felt come to fruition that day mixed with our destiny and purpose in the future plans of God on our planet.



Northern and Southern California Get Together

On December 5th, visiting members of the San Francisco Bay Area URANTIA Society joined FUSLA in presenting the monthly meeting.

Meeting goers were welcomed by soothing music provided by Francyl Streano Gawryn, accompanied on the guitar by Vern Bennom Grimsley.

Following the opening songs, the gathering of over one hundred people was guided into a worshipful mood by Bill Sherwood's music/slide presentation "Creation," followed by Bill Brehio reading moving words from The URANTIA Book.

A talk by Vern Grimsley, always a treat, was this afternoon entitled "Indomitable Courage and Unconquerable Faith." He challenged us to devote our efforts to helping bring the spiritual renaissance to Urantia.

After a break for socializing and enjoyment of a tasty array of food contributions, coordinated by Michael and Felice Long, the program resumed with Jeff Wattles acting out a lively cast of personalities to dramatize the Thinking vs. Feeling aspects of Worship.

Next came "Unification: The Eternal Quest," a multimedia presentation produced by Cosmic Pilgrim Productions under the direction of David and Sue Kantor. This production beautifully illustrates the personality as a unifier, and its unification in the life of Jesus.

Nancy Grimsley formally introduced the Northern California folks in attendance, which led into helpful talks by Marvin Gawryn and Bettina Gray on doing personal ministry.

Marvin emphasized building on common ground and genuinely respecting the other person's beliefs. As to overcoming fears about starting such conversations, his advice is simply to "plunge in."

For Bettina, people are a delight and personal ministry gives her the opportunity to "look through someone else's eyes at the universe. We're all like prisms—the light of God reaches us and breaks into many colors." In ministering to our fellows, it is necessary to be alive, creative, and have a strong sense of spiritual brotherhood. But we should refrain from "prescriptions." Bettina finds that knowing how and when to minister often comes through prayer.

Improving Communications

In response to your request for suggestions on how to improve communications, here are some ideas:

- 1. Offer a complete list of study groups' addresses throughout the world.
- **2.** Send an <u>Agondonter</u> free of charge to interested persons. Get names through present subscribers, book stores, URANTIA Foundation, URANTIA Brotherhood, etc.
- **3.** Write an article encouraging all study groups to intercommunicate, and all readers to pray for the new readers to be located.
- **4.** Encourage more leadership within study groups. Many readers are much too passive. This revelation is snowballing and more leaders for new groups are absolutely essential. Remember the book indicates progress is indispensible. With the words of wisdom contained in the U. Book we can progress with subtle sagacity.
- **5.** Bring your publication closer to your readers (and save money) by using lighter-weight inexpensive paper.

Bob: Thanks for your ideas. Here is some feedback. We'd like to hear from other readers on these points too.

- 1. Good idea. But we are concerned about protecting people's privacy and preventing misuse of the list and possible detriment to the evolutionary spread of the revelation. Any ideas on safeguards? If we do make such a list, do you want to be included in it?
- 2. We already send a free copy to those who request it or are referred to us. But our mailing list grows, like the revelation itself, evolutionarily, by word of mouth.
 - 3. OK, somebody, write an article and send it in!
 - 4. Agreed. Very important.
- **5.** We've been considering cheaper paper. Also a smaller page size, perhaps $7 \times 8-1/2$ to fit into your URANTIA Book. (That would be nice for maps and study aids we plan for future issues, and for Study Group listings.) We've also thought of going to one-color printing, that is, blue instead of blue-and-black. How about it, readers? What do you think? --ed.
