SOCIETY NEWS UPDATE

On May 14, 1983 URANTIA Society of Central Connecticut held its annual business meeting. Elections were held for officers of our Society. We would like to congratulate Alison Gardner—our new President, Avi Dogim—our new Vice-President, Lynn Sherman—our new Treasurer, Eileen Laurence—our new Secretary. We all wish them well. Our thanks to the outgoing officers who ably served us for the past two years—Peter Laurence ex-President, Alison Gardner ex-Vice-President, Helena Sprague ex-Treaserer, and Barbara Dreier ex-Secretary.

The highlight of the meeting was the induction of three new members: Richard Brinkman of Queens, NY and Marty & Gloria Greenhut of Hillsdale, NY. With the addition of these new

members our ranks now swell to 30 active members.

A committee of 12 members of USCC has decided to offer its services as site selectors and coordinators of the 1987 International URANTIA Brotherhood Conference. The last one was held in 1981 at Snowmass, Colorado, the one next year 1984 will be held in Green Bay, Wisconsin. Preliminary site selection for 1987 is now going on. The possibilities will be submitted to the URANTIA Brotherhood who ultimately will decide if we on the East Coast will be offered the service opportunity of hosting this conference.

John Murney, Chairman of USCC Resource Committee, has been forging ahead with his project of placing URANTIA Books in libraries. He needs your help! EVALUATION OF REGIONAL MEETING

On April 23, ninety-three URANTIA Book readers attended the three regional conferences in New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts. The topic was, "Enhanced Understanding of the Kingdom of Heaven."

Sixty-two participants completed evaluations. About 90% gave the conference high marks; there were a few concerns about missing or unspecified leadership. Several expressed disappointment about the meal arrangements and more than a few about the children's program.

Twenty-nine people requested two conferences a year and thirteen requested three. Seven wanted only one; others ranged from four to six. Other replies included:

Enthusiasm for conferences is gratifying to those who have worked on them, some several times! U.S.C.C. encourages local study groups to organize conferences in their own areas. (Smile with us: Of those who requested six conferences, none offered to assist!)

A notebook containing records of past regionals—arrangements, program, cost, U.S.C.C. sponsorship—is available to any study group which wishes to borrow it. Also, let the Society hear from you if you have suggestions regarding sites, meals, programs or children's activities for meetings of the whole region.

Eleven participants at the April 23 meetings have offered to help with future conferences, for which we extend our thanks; some of them are already working on the fall meeting. The program and reservation form for the October regional are enclosed in this issue of the Finaliter.

IN THE LIBRARY

The URANTIA Society of Central Connecticut's (USCC) Resource Committee has been compiling a list of libraries in the Northeast that have the URANTIA Book on their shelves. The results have been interesting.

Based on the URANTIA Foundation's 1980 list for New England and information from our own network of readers, the list includes the names of 92 libraries in the six New England states The list also includes 20 libraries in the northern New Jersey and eastern New York areas.

A breakdown shows that Massachusetts has the greatest number of books with a total of 36. Connecticut follows with 23 books within the state's libraries. The other states have an even distribution with Maine having nine, and New Hampshire, Vermont and Rhode Island showing eight each. Eastern New York lists 12 and northern New Jersey has eight.

It is almost certain that these numbers are incomplete, reflecting an incomplete view.

There may be dozens more.

Of the 92 libraries on the list, 22 have received their books from our society; 14 in the past 15 months alone.

Northern New England has been the most active area for donations of late, with books accepted this Spring in Barre, Vermont and Hanover, New Hampshire. Response to a new donation by library goers in Great Barrington, Massachusetts was so great that our donor requested another book which was quickly placed. We have since received mail from folks who have discovered those books with their USCC stickers adjacent to the title page. We have even received a letter of thanks from a librarian in Petersham, Massachusetts for a book donated to his library.

Most recent donations have been made to the Greenfield Public Library in Greenfield, Massachusetts and the Columbia Green Community College Library in Hudson, New York. The Cape Code study group has continued to be active in its area libraries with nine books

placed to date.

The URANTIA Book Placement Program has been growing steadily over the past two years, however there is still much work ahead. If you would like to take part in placing books or perhaps know of libraries in your area having the URANTIA Book, please let us know. We'll be happy to hear from you.


